## DR. LAW'S DEATH.

The Evening News of Detroit, 2nd inst., contains the following account of the death of Dr. Law, nephew of Mr. R. E. Law and Mrs. Amos Wright of this village:—"It is believed that the late Dr. R. R. S. Law of Dearborn, sacrificed his life to his profession, for although suffering from the grippe he continued to respond to the calls of patients when he ought to have been in bed himself. Dr. Law, although only 27 years old, enjoyed a large practice and was considered an excellent physician. He was the son of Dr. and Mrs. T. V. Law, his father having practised medicine for years in Detroit and Dearborn. Born in Detroit July 31, 1873, he attended the Ypsilanti Normal School and Michigan University, and in 1897 graduated from the Detroit College of Medicine. The same year he removed to Dearborn. His death resulted from congestion of the brain, brought on by the grippe. Dr. Law was health officer of Dearborn in 1899, a charter member of the Citizens' Life Insurance Company of Detroit, and a member of the Modern Woodmen of America. Besides his parents he is survived by two brothers, William and Harold, and two sisters, Gertrude and Helen. The funeral took place from the family residence in Dearborn; interment in Northview cemetery. Many beautiful floral tributes were sent by sorrowing friends."
