#### Start a Gun Club.

To the Editor of THE LIBERAL

DEAR SIR,—I see by your last issue  
that the Richmond Hill Lacrosse Club  
has elected their annual meeting and  
elected officers and are perfecting or-  
ganization to go forth and conquer.  
It is a source of gratification to know  
that we have in this vicinity a number  
of young men who are willing to de-  
vote their time and energy to keep  
alive and perpetuate this, our National  
Game. I think all true lovers of sport  
(and I hope that embraces the general  
public) will take an interest in and re-  
joice at their success.

Like many who have outlived their  
lacrosse days, I have wished myself  
young again while watching a game,  
and was reminded of the good old  
games of "shinney on your own side,"  
and the old log school house, and me  
thinks I hear a sigh from some of "the  
Old Boys" when they take their way  
homeward to play their old game of  
"chasing the doilars." Poor old boys!  
Is there no game that we can play  
without lowering our dignity? I  
think there is, and it is scientific, and  
may become necessary. I refer to  
shooting. We are in this young  
country making history very fast this  
last few years, and have learned much  
and have some very knotty problems  
before us. One of the lessons we have  
learned by the South African War, is  
our need of defence, and one of our  
greatest problems is a method of de-  
fence. We cannot all be soldiers and  
be drilled and disciplined into all that  
goes to make up a soldier's existence,  
but one thing we can do to a large ex-  
tent, learn that most necessary thing,  
how to shoot. And how to make a  
nation of good shots is one of the  
greatest problems that is before us to-  
day. I believe it to be the duty of  
every loyal Canadian to encourage as  
far as possible the science of shooting.

I see that in Western Ontario they  
have quite a number of Gun Clubs,  
and hold an annual tournament at  
which a number of American crack-  
shots compete. Why should not  
Richmond Hill have a Gun and Rifle  
Club combined? I could name a  
number of men of Richmond Hill and  
vicinity whose standing and knowl-  
edge of the gun might be made to  
serve a useful purpose in "teaching  
the young idea how to shoot," and  
secure not a little pleasure in so doing.  
Won't somebody say what they think  
about it?

one second in five degrees of an arc, of  
four drops in a gallon and so on.
