THE LEADER HAS THE FLOOR.

It will now be in order for The Leader and Recorder of West York to explain. In its last issue in November it quoted a speech delivered in British Columbia by Mr. N.C. Wallace, showing that our member accused the French-Canadians of Quebec of disloyalty. A few days ago in Parliament Mr. Tarte and Mr. Wallace crossed swords on an item relating to the taking of the census when the Minister of Public Works charged Mr. Wallace with unfairness in pointing out that the French-Canadians were a conquered race and were disloyal. Mr. Wallace arose and denied that he ever said such a thing. This is the quotation taken from Mr. Wallace's organ in West York:—

"Mr. Clarke Wallace asserted that Mr. Sifton's claim that French-Canadians were loyal was balderdash. Everybody knows that in the Liberal camp were such traitors as Bourassa and Monet, and the Conservatives had proved that a member of the Government was also a traitor. Laurier himself had positively refused to send a contingent until forced to do so. Tarte had said that not a man should be sent to fight British battles. He had stated at Laval University that one of the paramount duties of the French members was to show that they were Frenchmen. He had stated in his letter that the French-Canadians were longing for the day when they can throw off the thralldom of Great Britain. Their loyalty was only lip loyalty. They should bear in mind that they are a conquered race, and that never had a conquered race been treated with so much liberality, generosity and fairness as they had been treated by the British."

Doubtless The Leader and Recorder had no intention of misreporting Mr. Wallace, and if the latter did not wish to father it we wonder he did not make the correction at the time. THE LIBERAL refers to this matter now, probably, from the fact, that we copied the same alleged speech from The Leader and Recorder and we did so in the best of faith. It is not surprising that Members of Parliament will in individual cases accuse their political opponents of dishonorable acts, but we were surprised that even Mr. Wallace would make such a sweeping charge against the French-Canadian race as a whole.

MR. DUNCAN CRITICIZED.

Men who enter the field of politics often find their pillow not too soft, and their bed not one of roses. Certain acts may please one part of a constituency, but these acts may be at variance with the wishes of voters in different parts of the riding. Mr. Henry Duncan, reeve of York township, and Conservative candidate for the Local House in East York, is just now having a little experience along the line of local jealousies, as the following taken from the North Toronto news of Monday's World shows:

"Conservatives in East York are astonished at the bad breaks that Henry Duncan, the Conservative candidate for the Local House, has been making of late. By playing into the hands of the Toronto Railway in the matter of the Woodbine storage tracks, he has alienated the sympathy of the electors of the largest polling sub-divisions in East York, while his action on the Township local self-government by-law bids fair to lose for him scores of votes, all through the township. The people almost unanimously favor the by-law, and Reeve Duncan stated at a public meeting held two weeks ago

that he would support it. When the by-law was brought up at the last meeting of the Council, the Reeve went back on his word, and opposed the by-law. It is the general opinion that the Conservatives will have to bring forward a man of greater tact than Reeve Duncan if they hope to carry East York in the coming local fight."

Although nothing has yet been decided by the Dominion Government about the 24th of May, it now seems to be generally understood that the day will continue to be a public holiday throughout Canada at least. If the day is proclaimed a permanent holiday, it will doubtless give general satisfaction. It has long been a day of popular recreation, it comes at one of the most delightful periods of the year, and it will serve to perpetuate the memory of the best sovereign that ever occupied the throne of Britain. The Government will make no mistake in placing on the statute books a law making the 24th of May a public holiday.
