THE LABOUR GAZETTE.

No mechanic or employer of labor should be without The Labour Gazette, a pamphlet of about 70 pages published monthly by the Department of Labor in connection with the Parliament of Canada. The April number contains reports from a large number of special correspondents on the condition of the labor market generally, and of special trades and industries, in particular, from many of the most important industrial centres in the Dominion. The reports give a comprehensive and concise account of the 1) cal conditions in the various trades, and are instructive as showing the various conditions from month to month, the possible opportunities of employment and other information of interest to employers and workingmen.

Among the other subjects treated in the last number are The Fishing Industry of Canada, The Quebec Trade Disputes Act, Wages and Hours in the Metal Trade in Canada, Legislation for the Protection of Employes in Mines, Enforcement of Alien Labour Act during March, Legal Decisions affecting Labor, etc., etc.

The statistical tables on the rate of wages and hours of employment prevailing in the various trades in Canada give full particulars in reference to the metal trades. These tables have been compiled by the Department from returns made by the owners of foundries, factories, workshops, secretaries of local unions and from reports prepared by the special correspondents of the Gazette.

GOOD ADVICE.

Mr. Borden, the Leader of the Opposition in the House of Commons, is earning for himself the respect of those on both sides of politics. At a banquet given in his honor by the Conservative Members of Parliament on Wednesday evening of last week he made it plain that he would never countenance the raising of any cry of race or creed. He looks upon the unity of the races as a tradition handed down by their former leader, Sir John McDonald, and he intends to maintain that tradition. Mr. Borden claims that the Conservative party "as a whole" have never added fuel to racial strife, but he admits that stray words may have been uttered by certain newspapers and politicians which are liable to do harm in this country. Mr. Borden's words could not be taken otherwise t'an as a protest against those elements which make for disunion and ill-will. The Leader of the Opposition closed his remarks on this subject in the following words:-"And when the Liberal-Conservative party in this country proposes to adopt any other policy with regard to the unity of the races or creeds on political lines, other than those I have suggested, then I shall be glad to hand back to the party the trust they were good enough to repose in me in the month of February last."

Canadians throughout the Dominion will be pleased to know that the memory of our late beloved queen is to be perpetuated by having her hirthday kept as a public holiday. A bill received its third reading in the Canadian House of Commons on

the 2nd instant making May 24th a public holiday whenever it falls on any day of the week other than Sunday, in which case the following Monday will be the holiday. In the discussion it was pointed out that as King Edward's birthday and Thanksgiving day both come in November, it would be well to combine the two in one celebration.

The British in South Africa are determinedly and unwaveringly driving the Boers into their corners, but they are doing it at a tremendous sacrifice. Late reports go to show that during the month of March the British losses exceeded 3,000 men, and that the total British casualties from death, not including the Colonials, from the beginning of the war to the end of March were 694 officers and 14,278 men.

The House of Commons on Thursday adopted without a dissenting voice the resolution introduced by Dr. Borden, providing for pensions for the general staff, the officers and men of the permanent corps, and the wives and children of officers.
