## VICTORIA DAY.

Large blue posters are out announcing the annual Spring Exhibition of the Richmond Hill and Yonge Street Agricultural Society in the park on the 24th of May. Awards will be given for horses, cattle, sheep, swine, poultry, dairy produce, ladies' work, grain, etc.; purses of \$100 and \$50, respectively, for a 2.30 and a 2.50 trot or pace; a cash prize of \$16.50 for the winning football team, and sports such as foot-racing, etc., etc. The proceedings will conclude with a grand concert in the evening, for which nothing but high-class talent has been secured. ## LAMP EXPLODED.

Friday evening about 9.30 Master Starr McMahon started to light a lamp. The chimney being hot—the light having just been blown out—he turned up the wick probably half an inch, and held an ignited match in the top of the chimney. Immediately there was an explosion. He then pulled the lamp on the floor when it broke and the oil took fire. No person was in the house at the time but Starr and Nora McMahon, Miss L. McMahon who is staying with the family, and little Irene who was asleep upstairs. Starr began dashing water on the flames, but as this was not effective, one of the members ran out and shouted for help. Mr. C. H. Ellston was the first to respond. Charlie went to work with a cushion in one hand and a piece of flannel clothing in the other, and in less than two minutes the fire was extinguished. In the meantime the fire alarm was sounded, and the engine and other apparatus was on the way when the firemen were informed their services were not required. The extent of the damage was a strip of linoleum in the dining-room burned, a couple of holes in a table cover, and two or three other small articles injured. The three fugitives were naturally very much frightened over their experience, but fortunately none of them were injured in the least. The editor who came home about five minutes after the accident felt the unexpected casualty very keenly as he could see the dangerous position in which his children and niece were placed. He wishes to tender his heartfelt thanks to neighbor Ellston, the members of the Fire Brigade and many others who so promptly responded when the alarm was sounded.
