Minutes of last meeting were read and adopted.

The object of the meeting was to consider a complaint lodged to the Chairman of the Board, stating that a disagreeable odor existed in the Village of Maple, and desired the Board to examine the trout ponds of Dr. Sisley, the slaughter-house and piggery of Wm. Wood, and the cow stable of John McQuarrie.

After making a thorough investigation of the above premises, the Medical Health Officer submitted the following report:

To the Board of Health of the township of Vaughan:

Gentlemen,—Having examined the premises in Maple this day (accompanied by the Board) of Dr. Sisley, Wm. Wood and John McQuarrie. I find no cause for any unsanitary odors existing, and would consider especially the trout ponds of Dr. Sisley a credit to their owner and an ornament to the village.

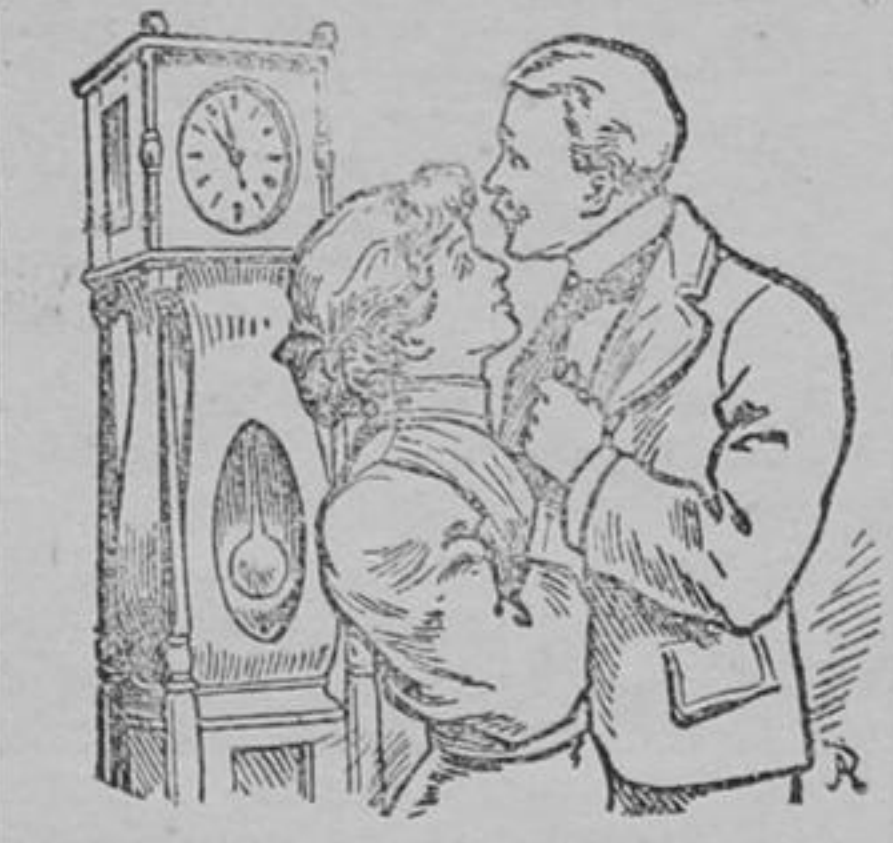
