RICHMOND HILL, June 6, 1901

The last bulletin sent out by the Ontario Government says that fall wheat could be classed a promising crop were it not for injury done by the Hessian fly. Rye is described as looking well, and clover came through the winter pretty safely. In the western portion of the province, where most of the orchards are to be found, fruit trees braved the storms of winter and came out in splendid condition. Spring seeding received a decided set back by flooding in low lying places, but notwithstanding this the prospects for spring crops on the whole are encouraging. The remarks of correspondents regarding farm labor and wages are deserving of careful consideration. The rush to the towns and cities continues, and in many cases it is difficult to get good farm hands. Domestic servants on the farm are also said to be even scarcer than ever.

The Cook Charges made last fall were intended to create an influence against the Dominion Government at the General Elections. The accusation was that the Government had agreed to give Mr. H. H. Cook a senatorship on payment of \$10,000. After an investigation in the Senate, which is largely Conservative, the charges have fallen to the ground. It is well that the investigation was held, though for the dignity of the House in future cases it would be better if some Member would take the responsibility of an inquiry. Mr. Cook may have been led by some person to believe that he could obtain the coveted position of a senator by paying for it, but the evidence offered would not warrant the belief that either Sir Richard Cartwright or any other member of Parliament ever made such an offer.

The Toronto World seems a little sour on the Conservative party these days. Although Mr. Borden, the leader of the Opposition, spoke in the city a week or two ago, there was not an editorial comment on his visit. A few days ago in an article headed "Whither are the Conservatives drifting," it found fault with three-fourths of the Conservative members in the House for signing a petition to guarantee a large sum of money to a company to build the Georgian Bay & Ottawa Canal. And later The World contained a piece of rhyme again ridiculing the party, headed "The Ghost of Old Sir John." This last piece goes to show that the former leader left the party in good shape, but that it has since his death gone to pieces.

News Notes.

George Greensides, a teamster in the employ of Cane & Sons, Newmarket, was run over by a loaded wagon Thursday morning and was killed.

Barbara Fenwick, relict of the late Arch. H. Fenwick, of Markham township, died at the residence of her son-in-law, Jas. L. Ross, on Saturday the 1st of June, in her 78th year. Deceased was interred in Cashel cemetery on Tuesday.

A public farewell was tendered to Rev. Father Morris in the Town Hall, Newmarket, Tuesday evening when the guest was presented with a handsome tea service, consisting of ten pieces, with a suitable inscription on each. The town band played a number of selections, Mayor cane occupied the chair, and Mr. D. Lloyd read an address. Short speeches were delivered by Rev. A. H. McGillivray, of Newmarket; Dean Egan of Barrie; Father McMahon of Thornhill; and Messrs. T. H. Brunton, J. W. Moyes, John Ramsden, T. H. Lennox and Hon. E. J. Davis. Rev. Father Morris goes to St. Catharines, and will be succeeded in Newmarket by Rev. Father Whitney.

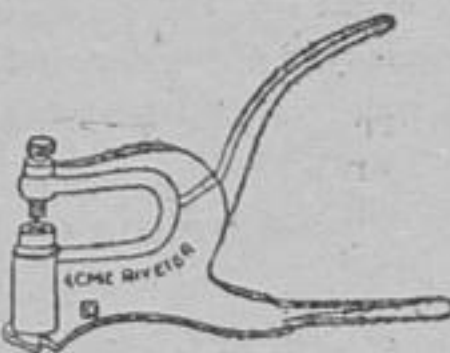

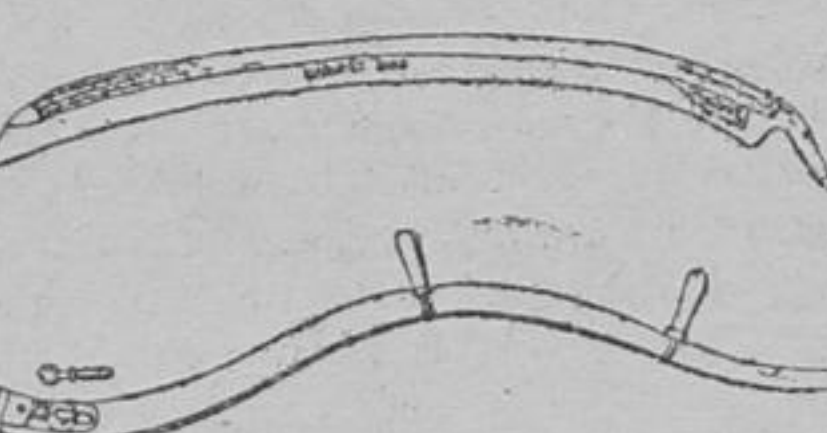

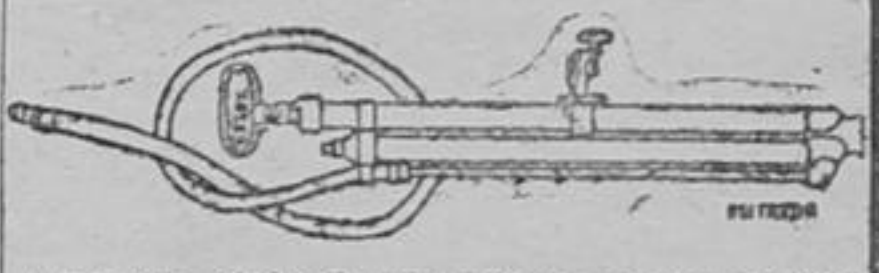
