A PROGRESSIVE POLICY.

Hon. G. W. Ross, Premier of Ontario, delivered an address in Brockville a few days ago, and clearly outlined the policy of his Government. A careful perusal of the speech should convince fair-minded men that the Government are making the most of Ontario's advantages, and are making substantial progress all along the line. The Premier pointed out that in his first speech after the formation of his Government, delivered at Whitby in November, 1899, he promised a certain course of action, and he was prepared to say that every promise then made had been fulfilled in spirit and in letter.

He promised to put the law in motion for the punishment of persons reported by the judges for corrupt practices. To show that his promise was fulfilled, he stated that since the General Election thirty convictions had been secured and fines to the amount of \$7,500 imposed.

A commission had been appointed to report upon the financial standing of the Province, and it was shown that Ontario stood in an enviable position financially. It was shown that on the 31st day of December, 1899, the total treasury assets were \$7,393,462.74; total treasury liabilities \$5,124,968.30; giving a difference between the assets and liabilities, on the right side of the ledger, of \$2,268,494.44. This was the state of the surplus at the end of 1899, and it is gratifying to learn that last year the surplus was further increased by \$311,977.05.

The Premier then showed how he had kept his promise relative to a vigorous effort towards the development of Ontario. His Government had since that promise projected the Algoma Central Railway from Sault Ste. Marie northward, a distance of 140 miles, with a land grant of 7,500 acres a mile. The promoters of this road are bound to place 10,000 settlers along the line of railway within ten years, and to build a railway station in every block. The Government last session also provided for about 500 miles of railway through New Ontario, which will cost not a single dollar in money.

Last summer exploring parties were sent out and these reported that in New Ontario there were 16,000,000 acres of land well adapted for agriculture. They reported 3,000,000,000 feet of pine timber, 288,000,000 cords of pulpwood, which at 40 cents a cord would yield \$115,000,000.

Hon. G. W. Ross closed an able speech after speaking at length upon the agricultural exports, the promotion of manufactures, and the educational questions of the day.

The finding of the Grand Jury on the death of the late Wm. Boyd must have come as a rebuke to the Toronto World a few days ago. The World, after the unfortunate affair, called loudly for the resignation of Sheriff Widdifield, charging that public official with being the cause of the murder through carelessness. The Grand Jury exonerated the Sheriff from all blame in the murder and said: "Upon careful investigation we find that neither Sheriff Widdifield nor the officials are chargeable with any neglect of duty in the matter." Judge McDougall also said that in regard to the criticism of Sheriff Widdifield in connection with the recent tragedy he agreed entirely with the jury. The Sheriff, he said, could in no way be held responsible for the lack of a conveyance which it was the duty of the Government to provide.
