**The Liberal.**

RICHMOND HILL, June 27, 1901

Some of the county papers whose editors should be given credit for better judgment have been circulating a report, merely on the strength of a rumor, that Hon. W. W. Ross was likely to contest East York in the Liberal interests for a seat in the Ontario Legislature. The Premier flatly contracts the report in the following words:

"There is no truth whatever in the rumor that I purpose to allow myself to be nominated for the East Riding of the County of York as a candidate for the Legislative Assembly. My connection with West Middlesex has been so agreeable and pleasant and has extended over so long a period that I have decided if satisfactory to the Liberal party, to stand for that riding at the next election. No doubt East York, which has been represented in this House for the last two terms so ably and so worthily by Mr. John Richardson, will find a capable standard-bearer should Mr. Richardson be disposed to retire."

Were there a vacancy the Liberal party could have no higher honor bestowed upon it than to have Hon. G. W. Ross for its candidate. Nothing is to be gained, however, by circulating such a rumor without substantiation.

A writer in the Evening News of Saturday contended that butter-makers from the country are giving light weight. It is said that a delivery recently made from Newmarket weighed only 60 lbs., although there were 63 lb. rolls, and each roll supposed to contain a pound. Those who sell butter should be careful to give full weight, not only because it is right to do so, but because the Inspector has a legal right to confiscate what is found to be light in weight. This has often been done to the disgrace of the butter-maker. Every care should be given, not only in the manufacture of butter, but also in giving good weight.

England does not take kindly to the proposition to favor the British Colonies on trade lines. A few days ago in the House of Commons a resolution was introduced to remit one-third of the duty on sugar imported from the Colonies. The proposition was voted down by a majority of over 300 to 16. There can be no harm in Canadians expressing a wish that England would grant a preference to this country, but as we are not in a position to compel the Mother Country to take such a step it would not be wise to lose much sleep over the matter.

**Markham Council.**

The Township Council met at Victoria Hall, Unionville, on Tuesday, 18th inst. Members all present, the reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

A communication was read from D. Beaton, Clerk of Pickering, notifying the Council that Pickering had made a grant of \$15 to be expended on the townline at 3rd con. provided Markham grant a like amount.

Orville Kester claimed he was over-assessed for dogs.

Summerfeldt—Morrison—that the treas. pay Wm. Boyd \$2 for cleaning out ditch, opposite lot 29, con. 9.

Eckardt—Morrison—that the treas. pay the following damages for sheep worried by dogs—Thos. Palmer, \$1.

Sisley—Morrison—that the treas. pay Hargington Bros. \$74.02 being amount in full for all material furnished the municipality up to June 17th.

Eckardt—Summerfeldt—that a grant of \$50 be made to gravel the road opposite lots 31 to 34, con. 10, providing the ratepayers in the Division do a like amount gratis, the reeve and Mr. Hodgson, commissioners.

Eckardt—Sisley—that the treas. pay W. J. Davitt \$623.87 for 872 feet concrete p.p., sizes from 10 to 31 inches.

Eckardt—Summerfeldt—that a grant of \$16 be made to drain the road opposite lot 29 in 10th con. providing the ratepayers in that division draw the tile gratis; and that Adam Betz be commissioner to expend the same.

Sisley—Morrison—that the sewer piping be placed under the care of Mr. Jos. Grove, and that he deliver the

same only on order of a councillor or road overseer. That only 10, 12, 14 and 18 inch pipes be sold to private parties, and that Mr. Grove receive 15c. per hour for time actually spent in delivering the said pipes; that no pipes above 18 inches be delivered except on order of Councillor, and that the seal of the Corporation be attached hereto.

Summerfeldt—Eckardt—that the clerk be authorized to add the following names to the assessment roll:—W. J. Barnes, con. 9 E, lot 20, \$2000; Jas. Stacey, con. 8, lot 6, \$2700; Bernard Cookwell, con. 9 W, lots 3 and 4, \$6000; Mrs. Mary Hamilton, con. 9 W, lot 30, \$100.

Eckardt—Morrison—that the mover and Mr. Sisley be commissioners to build a new bridge between lots 5 and 6, con. 2; also that Mr. Sisley be commissioner to repair bridge opposite lot 13, con. 3, also that Mr. Sisley be commissioner to repair bridge between lots 30 and 31, con. 5 at Albira; that the mover and Mr. Geo. Leek be commissioners to build new bridge opposite lot 10, con. 3, also that the mover and Mr. Sisley be commissioners to repair bridge at lots 10 and 11, con. 4, and that the several amounts be payable on the order of the commissioners.

Summerfeldt—Eckardt—that the treas. pay E. Wismer \$6 for equalizing assessment between Markham, Kingwood, Unionville, Stouffville and Whitechurch Union schools; also Walter Scott \$4.00 for equalizing Union School Sections between Townships of Markham and Vaughan and Village of Richmond Hill.

Sisley—Morrison—that the treas. pay Frisby Bros. for operating Road Machine as certified by overseers for 1033 days, \$103.75.

Morrison—Summerfeldt—that when this Council adjourns it stands adjourned until July 16th next.

Summerfeldt—Eckardt—that treas. pay the following accounts:—

Mr. Grove entered into an agreement with the Council to sell the municipality all the gravel under water on condition that the Council drain the same.

Summerfeldt—Sisley—that the reeve and Mr. Morrison be commissioners to stake out and drain Jos. Grove's gravel pit on lot 16, in 8th con., amount payable on their order when work is completed.

Sisley—Morrison—that the treas. pay Jos. Grove \$5.00 for gravel furnished this municipality—50 yards—for sewer piping.

Sisley—Summerfeldt—that Mr. A. McPherson be appointed caretaker of the wheel turnpike shovel, he to charge and collect 50c. per day for all except Township contractors, who shall pay 50c. per day for overtime; the caretaker to be paid \$2.00 per year for his services.
