Gallagher—Burns—that the sum of

to the Trustees of School Section num-
ber twenty-three on their furnishing
approved note satisfactory to the
treasurer with interest at the rate of
five per cent. per annum.—Carried.

Crossley—Rogers—that John Crook
be paid \$2.02 Commutation labor of
Helen Smith and John Willis also
Thos. Borden \$1.50 commuted Statute
labor on the Webb estate, middle part
of Lot 22, con. 6.

Crossley—Burns—that the council
resolve into a Court of Revision for
the purpose of reconsidering the ap-
peal of Henry Graham when the fol-
lowing resolution was passed.
That the assessment on lot 13 in the
2nd con., n. s., be reduced from \$400
to \$250.

Gallagher—Burns—that the clerk
pro tem be and he is hereby authorized
to prepare a by-law to regulate the
wages to be paid teams and men do-
ing Municipal work and to repeal any
former by-laws or resolutions regard-
ing the same.

Council adjourned to meet at Bond
Lake Hotel on Saturday, the 27th day
of July, A. D. 1901.

collected.

The by-law was read a first, second
and third time and passed.
