THE LABOR GAZETTE.

The June number of the Labor Gazette is just to hand. The issue completes the first volume, making ten numbers altogether. In the last number is commenced a series of articles on the industries of Canada, in which coal, iron, copper and nickel, lumbering, fishing and agricultural industries have been made the subject of special investigation. The Gazette is growing in popularity, and should be in the hands of every laborer and mechanic. The Toronto Star of the 6th inst has an article bearing on its usefulness, the last paragraph of which reads as follows:

The Labor Gazette has fulfilled the expectations of its founders. It is a creditable and valuable publication. In the parliamentary discussions of last session the leaders of the Opposition admitted this. The Canadian Gazette compares most favorably with the British Labor Gazette, which is the official organ of the British Government in all labor matters, and it is certainly inferior to no similar publication in the United States. The small subscription price of twenty cents a year places the journal within reach of every workingman and woman in the Dominion. It is not only one of the cheapest but it is one of the best publications of its kind in existence, and is a credit to Canada. The first volume, now complete, contains hundreds of pages of original matter requiring the most careful research and judicious preparation, and invaluable to the industrial classes, both masters and men, everywhere. At the recent annual convention at St. Louis of the National and State Labor Bureaus of the United States, the Gazette and the department of which it is the journal were, as the reports of the meetings show, the subjects of marked compliment. In the formation of an international association, the Canadian Department was ranked next in precedence to the National Department at Washington, while the young editor of the Gazette was elected one of the vice-presidents of the international body.

According to a special despatch to the daily papers a few days ago Hon. J. I. Tarte is much impressed with the Toronto Collingwood air line route. He thinks if the railway were an accomplished fact it would result in the establishment of a fleet of Canadian grain carriers on Lake Ontario. The Minister is not at present in a position to say whether or not the Government will grant aid to this project. He has instructed the Superintendent Engineer for the Public Works Department at Port Colborne to report to him at length upon the various waterways for western freight through Canadian territory, and the cost of handling grain by each. It is not unlikely that the north channel of the Georgian Bay may be dredged in connection with the scheme for improving the French River route. Mr. Tarte is convinced that by making this route fit for navigation it will become one of the chief arteries for conveying grain from the Canadian west to Montreal. He believes in having several Canadian waterways and thinks there will be business enough to keep them all employed.

The Markham Sun last week had an editorial condemning the present license system, and advocating in its place the public ownership of the liquor traffic. It is difficult to tell whether the article is intended to aid the temperance cause, or those engaged in the sale of liquor. Be this as it may it is evident that The Sun would like to see a change in the Government of the Province. The article starts as follows:—"It is becoming more evident every day that the present liquor license system is a vicious one. License-holders are put under new hardships every day in a vain attempt to keep men from drinking. The license-holder is being used by political machines to further their own unscrupulous ends. The remedy for this evil lies in the fact that the public should own, operate and control the liquor sale." Would The Sun kindly let us know next week what it would cost to buy up all the hotels, breweries and distilleries in Ontario.

The Statistical Year Book of Canada for 1900, which is the 16th year of issue, is just to hand. The volume has over 600 pages, and contains a pretty complete history of the Dominion. The work appears to be accurate, and many new features have been introduced since last year. The statistician gives papers bearing on the physical features of the country, the Constitution and Government, area, population, treaties, agricultural statistics, minerals, fisheries, trade and commerce, militia statistics, railways and canals, post office, with social and other statistics. The work also contains a list of the Senators, Members of the House of Commons, and Members of the Provincial Legislatures, with a short history of each of the Provinces of the Dominion. The work is very complete up to the end of 1900.
