The Liberal.

The World is a newspaper of great enterprise. It boasts of being the leader in disseminating news, and in some cases it certainly is the leader. On Monday The World outstripped all competitors by publishing a despatch stating that Mr. Chamberlain is determined that the next Governor-General of Canada shall be a Canadian. Not only this, but it is said that Mr. Chamberlain's first choice for the position is Sir Charles Tupper. There can be little likelihood of Mr. Chamberlain agitating in favor of a Canadian Governor, and there can be no truth in the report that he would recommend Sir Charles Tupper or any other rabid politician. As long as Canada is a part of the British Empire there are strong reasons why a British nobleman should preside at Rideau Hall, one who is not supposed to know anything of the political strife in this country. The Liberals would have no more faith in Sir Charles Tupper than the Conservatives would have in Sir Richard Cartwright, and both would be failures as Governors-General.

It is against the principles of Liberalism in this country for the Dominion Government to veto bills passed by Provincial Legislatures. There are exceptional cases, however, where interference is necessary, especially when measures are passed which may have their effects in places outside the particular province in which they have been carried. Such a case seems to be staring the Dominion Government in the face just now. Some time last year the Legislature of British Columbia enacted legislation which had for its object the prohibition of Japanese and Chinese labor. The Hon. Joseph Chamberlain has expressed anxiety about the measure, as he fears such a bill might endanger the good feeling which now exists between England and Japan. If this is the case there is little doubt that Imperial interests will demand the disallowance of the measure. There is a strong feeling in British Columbia against the immigration of Chinese or Japanese labor, and this unfortunately is growing instead of weakening.

Several commercial bodies in some of the leading cities of the United States have recently passed resolutions favoring reciprocity with Canada. Trade between the two countries is certainly hampered by the high duties, but this can be remedied to a large extent if our neighbors will simply lower their tariff to the level of the Canadian tariff. These two countries should naturally trade with each other with as few obstacles between them as possible.

Markham Council.

Markham Township Council met at Unionville on Tuesday, July 16. Members all present, the reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

A report was received from License Inspector Eckardt re License fund collected.

A petition was presented by D. Lynett and 98 others, asking the Township to assume the road known as Centre street (Richmond Hill).

County Councillor Quantz reported on York roads settlements.

Sisley-Morrison—that the treasurer pay Frisby Bros. for operating in several divisions as certified by overseers, \$161.35.

Sisley-Morrison—that the treasurer pay the Treasurer of Vaughan 1/2 the account presented re Yonge Street amounting to \$170.22.

Sisley-Summerfeldt—that the treasurer pay Harrington Bros. \$80.04 being account in full for lumber supplied to July 10.

Eckardt-Morrison—That Mr. Arthur Quantz be commissioner to collect the amount of standing rent for Thornhill toll-house.

Summerfeldt-Morrison—that Mr. John Eckardt be commissioner to repair approach to bridge, lots 10 and 11, con. 6. Also to repair culvert opposite lot 11, con. 6.

Summerfeldt-Eckardt—that the mover and Mr. Morrison be commissioned to repair east end and wing of of bridge between lots 25 and 26, con. 7.

Summerfeldt-Eckardt—that Mr. Morrison be commissioner to repair bridge on Yonge St and build railing opposite lot 27, con. 8.

Summerfeldt-Sisley—that Mr. Morrison be commissioner to repair railing opposite lot 20, con. 9, and new culvert opposite lot 23, con. 8.

Sisley-Morrison—that Mr. Summerfeldt be commissioner to build new bridge opposite lot. 30, con. 7.

Sisley-Eckardt—that whereas a petition consisting of 98 ratepayers of the township of Markham has been presented to the council to assume the road known as Centre street, the necessary steps be taken to assume the said road and make it a township highway. The yeas and nays being called for resulted as follows: Yeas—Sisley, Nays—Dimma, Eckardt, Summerfeldt and Morrison.

Sisley-Morrison—that the reeve and the mover be commissioners in conjunction with committee of the township of Vaughan, to purchase a rock crusher if Vaughan council be willing to pay one half the price of the machine.

Eckardt-Summerfeldt—that the treasurer pay the following gravel accounts: Henry Rumble, \$4.50; H. Gamble, \$12.60; T. Thomson, \$4.10, also damage to road to pit, \$1; Thos. Thomson, \$1.40; C. P. Read, \$34.50; A. Russell, \$24.50.

Summerfeldt-Eckardt—that the treasurer pay the following accounts: W. Frisby, repairing road grader, \$5.75; Thos. Hageman, repairing culvert, \$1.50; J. Hickson, account for road repairs, \$6.50; Wm. Frisby, incidental road expenses, \$2.65; Alf. McPherson, rods, bolts and spikes, \$16; E. H. Sisley, freight on grader knife, 25c.

Eckardt-Summerfeldt—that when this council adjourns it stands adjourned until the 13th of August.

Morrison-Summerfeldt—that Mr. Sisley be commissioned to examine Mr. Leach's gravel. Council then adjourned.
