The Saginaw Lumber Company, which has secured timber limits on the north shore of Lake Huron, are preparing to move their big mill from Saginaw City to the Canadian side. The Cleveland Lumber and . Sawing Company have already commenced erecting a mill. They have purchased timber limits in the Township of Foster, on the north shore of Lake Huron. Both of these companies have been compelled to transfer their operations to the Canadian side owing to the prohibition of the exportation of sawlogs. They will give employment to about 200 men.

According to a number of Conserv. ative papers it is a crime for a Cabinet Minister in the Ontario Government to enter into any business transaction outside his own province. Some time ago the Hon. John Dryden, Minister of Agriculture, invested in some shares of a Dakota ranching company, and he is now called upon to resign on the ground that. such a transaction is unpatriotic. Englishmen, for instance, invest their money in all parts of the world, and nothing is ever said about it. It speaks well for farmer John Dryden that after many years in the Government this is the most serious charge that can be laid against him.
