Canada's Great Fair.

Matters never looked more promis-
ing for the Toronto Exhibition, to be
held from August 26 to September 7,
than they do this year. Entries in all
departments are good, while in live
stock and manufactures they are well
in excess of previous years. The show
of cattle is bound to be superior to
anything ever seen in Canada before,
a number of prize animals having been
imported especially for exhibition at
Toronto. The Right Hon. Sir Wilfrid
Laurier, Premier of the Dominion, on
Tuesday, August 27, will undoubtedly
have the gratification of opening the
best of the twenty-three successive
annual exhibitions that will have been
held at the capital of the Province.
It will be thoroughly representative
of the industrial arts, agricultural and
horticultural products and general re-
sources of this great country, and will
abound in entertaining as well as in-
structive features. As becomes these
warlike times the military will be
much in evidence, arrangements hav-
ing been made by permission of the
General Officer Commanding and the
Minister of Militia for daily practice
with Maxim and other guns by the
Royal Canadian Artillery, and for
various cavalry evolutions by the
Royal Dragoons. There will be the
usual trotting, pacing and running
races, balloon ascents by a man who
escapes from a balloon that explodes a
thousand feet in air, an entertainment
of great variety in front of the grand
stand, athletic sports, butter-making
tests, judging competitions, experi-
ments in photography by wire, an in-
ternational military tattoo on the
opening night, the best dog show in
America, lectures on the cultivation
of the sugar beet, music by a score of
the finest bands in America, and in
fact more attractions and novelties
than could be enumerated in a column
of this newspaper, the whole being
nightly crowned by a representation
of the Bombardment of the Taku Forts
by the Allied Forces in China, con-
cluding with a brilliant display of fire-
works. While every day will be a
great day from August 26 to Sept. 7,
the day of days will be Tuesday, Sept.
3, when a reunion of Canadian Old
Boys and Students from all the col-
leges and schools in Canada will be
held. The following day will be Farm-
ers' Day, but the probabilities are that
with a full programme every day and
favorable rates on the railways the
grounds will always be thronged by
delighted crowds. Canada's Great
Exposition will play second fiddle to
no other.

Public Library

The Public Library Board met in
the Council Chamber, Monday even-
ing, August 19.
Members present: Messrs. P. G.
Savage (chairman), W. A. Sanderson,
J. H. Brydon, H. A. Nicholls and T.
F. McMahon.
Minutes of last meeting read and
adopted.

An account from Mr. Sanderson for
glue, paint, postage, freight on books,
etc., amounting to \$4.18, was on mo-
tion of Messrs. Brydon and Nicholls
ordered to be paid.

Nicholls—Brydon—that the Village
Council be requested to levy a tax on
the municipality of \$80.00, to meet the
running expenses of the Public Library
for the year.—Carried.

Brydon—Savage—that the Book
Committee be authorized to expend
\$100 on books for the Public Library,
and \$50 on magazines, newspapers,
etc., for the Reading Room.—Carried.

The Board adjourned after a request
that citizens hand the names, to the
Secretary or Book Committee, of any
suitable books they wish to have
placed in the Public Library, to be
purchased if approved of by the Com-
mittee.

Board then adjourned.

Markham Council.

Council met on August 14. Mem-
bers all present. Reeve in the chair.

firmed.

Eckardt—Summerfeldt—that the
clerk be and is hereby instructed to
write Hon. J. M. Gibson in reply to
his communication re Assessment Act,
that this council favors the proposed
amendment to the Assessment Act as
drafted in the bill submitted to them.
—Carried.

Sisley—Morrison—that the treasurer
be and is hereby authorized to pay
Harrington Bros. the sum of \$208.12,
for material furnished this municipali-
ty up to date.—Carried.

pay Edward Kirk the sum of \$10, be-
ing two-thirds the value of sheep killed
and injured by dog or dogs.—
Carried.

Sisley—Morrison—that when this
council adjourns it stands adjourned
until Sept. 17.—Carried.

Eckardt—Sisley—that the reeve and
Mr. Morrison be and are hereby ap-
pointed a committee to purchase one
rock crusher for township purposes,
and that the township of Vaughan be
allowed to have one half share if de-
sired.—Carried.

Mr. Eckardt introduced a by-law ap-
pointing Mr. W. F. Nichols collector
for the west half and Mr. R. Lunan
for the east half.

Mr. Summerfeldt introduced a by-
law to amend By-Law No. 470, to in-
crease collectors' salary.
Council then adjourned.
