

> The official report of the Census out. According to this report Canada, four months ago, had a population of 5,338,883. The population shows an increase of 505,644 compared with 1891. This is equivalent to a gain of about ten per cent., whereas the gain of the previous ten years was twelve per cent. Of the seven provinces Quebec exhibits the largest gain in population, having 132,439 more than in 1891. Manitoba comes next with 93,958, and British Columbia third with 91,827. Ontario comes fourth with a gain of 53,657. New Brunswick shows a gain of 9,830, and Nova Scotia 8,720. The Territories have increased by 78,201. Prince Edward Island is the only province showing a loss in population, this loss being 5,820. is as follows .
