## WRIST FRACTURED.

Mr. Wyc. Trench, Principal of the Unionville Public School, who has been spending his holidays at his home here, has been again unfortunate. He had been assisting L. Innes & Sons in taking down one of the buildings at Patterson, and on Friday afternoon last received a severe fall. He had just sawn off a heavy sill eleven feet from the ground, and placing his foot on the part sawn off went down with the stick of timber on rough ground. He will probably return to his school in a couple of weeks.

## FIREMEN'S EXCURSION.

Reeve Savage, in compliance with a requisition of citizens, having proclaimed Thursday, August 29, a Civic Holiday for the Village of Richmond Hill, a grand excursion under the auspices of the Fire Brigade will be run on that day to Niagara Falls and Buffalo. The excursion will be run over the Metropolitan Railway, and the Niagara, St. Catharines and Toronto Navigation Co. Special cars will leave Richmond Hill at 6.15 Thursday morning, stopping for passengers at Thornhill and other places south. Excursionists will be taken over the city cars in time for one of the Company's handsome steamers which leave Yonge St. wharf for Port Dalhousie at 8 a. m. The trip from Port Dalhousie to Niagara Falls will be made over the electric railway through a most charming country, and the route from Niagara Falls to the Pan-American is delightfully picturesque. Excursionists who go right through will reach the Exposition Grounds at 1.30 p. m. Those who wish to return to Richmond Hill the same day will have to reach the Exposition grounds at 4, reaching Toronto at 9.30 p. m., but the tickets will be good to return on any regular boat or car on Friday or Saturday. Steamboats leave Port Dalhousie for Toronto at 8 and 11 a. m. and 2 and 5 p. m. A late Metropolitan car will convey passengers north on the arrival of the boat Thursday night. Tickets for round trip to Niagara Falls, \$1.35; children, 90 cents. Tickets from Toronto, \$1.00; children, 75 cents. Return tickets from Niagara Falls to Pan-American, adults 70 cents.
