tions, great entertainments and fire-
works. Spectacle of the bombard-
ment of the Taku Forts, &c.

**TUESDAY—Canada Old Boys' and

Exhibition open, including the great
International Dog Show, judging of
horses, butter-making and other com-
petitions. Entertainment in front of
grand stand during the afternoon. In
the evening concerts by several bands,
entertainment in front of grand stand,
concluding with the naval and mili-
tary pyrotechnical spectacle, the bomb-
ardment of the Taku Forts, extensive
programme of fire works, etc.

WEDNESDAY—Farmers' Day—Extra
competitions and exhibits in the var-
ious departments. All buildings open
from 8 a. m. till 10 p. m. All the
horses and cattle will be paraded in
the rings. Bare-back horse riding
competition; dog show, poultry show,
display of implements and machinery,
wonderful electrical displays, farmers'
trot, etc. Full program in the even-

The managers of the new shoe
factory in Aurora expect to be in full
operation by the middle of September.

The date of Bolton Fair has been
changed from Oct. 3 and 4 to Monday
and Tuesday, Oct. 7 and 8.

Tees, Montreal, drowned; Chas. W.
Deegan, Hull, committed suicide.
