### A GOOD YIELD.

A sample of Russian barley is at THE LIBERAL Office grown on Mr. Comisky's farm, 2nd con. of Markham, formerly known as Rennie's Silver Medal Farm. The grain is plump, and that the yield was good may be judged from the fact that Mr. John Wice threshed for the proprietor 1,300 bushels in ten hours. The barley averaged 45 bushels to the acre. With the exception of Wild Goose wheat, Mr. Comisky's other grains were equally good, his oats, timothy and clover being particularly heavy.

### RICHMOND HILL HIGH SCHOOL.

The Richmond Hill Board of Education has issued a neat card showing the different courses of instruction to be taken in the Richmond Hill High School, which re-opens next Tuesday. This card refers to a Teacher's Course, Junior Matriculation, and a Commercial Course. The subjects in the last named course are English, History, Arithmetic, Algebra, Book-Keeping, Shorthand, Penmanship and Typewriting. A new Underwood Typewriter is supplied for this course. The Junior Matriculation is prescribed for entrance into the University, Medicine, Mining, Dentistry, Engineering, Law, Surveying, and Theology. The Teacher's Course is said to be the best general course, whether intending to be teachers or not. Among the features referred to are Wide-Awake Teachers, Firm Discipline, Good Companions, Attractive Grounds, New Buildings, Annual Games, First-Class Board, Excellent Churches and Public Library.
