SUDDEN DEATH.

Mrs. Leazette Jenkins, widow of the late James Jenkins of this place, died suddenly at the residence of her son near Strange, King township, on Wednesday of last week. Deceased had been as well as usual up to a few minutes before the end came. She was engaged in housework, and complained of a pain about the heart. Her son, who was working in one of the fields close by, was immediately sent for, but the mother lived only a few minutes after he reached the house. The interment took place in the cemetery at the rear of the Presbyterian Church on Friday, when many friends gathered to pay their last mark of respect and esteem to the departed. She was well and favorably known in this section of country, and though well advanced in years was fond of visiting among her relatives and friends, possessing a vivacious temperament. Deceased had resided in this village for many years, and was a general favorite not only with her relatives, but with a large circle of friends and acquaintances. She leaves a large family of sons and daughters to mourn the loss of a kind and loving mother.

BROUGHT HOME FOR BURIAL.

The remains of the late Thomas Mortson, jr., third son of the late Thomas Mortson, sr., of Jefferson, were conveyed through here by hearse on Thursday last, and buried in the family plot in St. John's Cemetery. Deceased died in Indian Territory where he had resided for a number of years. The following item relative to the death of deceased is clipped from The Evening Telegram of Chickasha, Indian Territory: "Mr. Thomas J. Mortson died on Saturday, August 24, at the house of Ed. Johns. Mr. Mortson came to Chickasha last October and has held the responsible position of cashier of the Rock Island freight office. He was thirty years of age. He had been sick for two weeks with typhoid fever, but his death was hastened by nervous complications contracted by extra work in his department incident to the rush of the past few weeks. His sister Florence was attacked with fever at the same time and she is now being cared for at the residence of Dr. Tye. Henry Morton of Fort Worth, and Joe Lomas of Houston, brother and brother-in-law respectively, came up to pay their respects to their departed loved one. The remains were taken to Toronto, Canada, his former home, where his mother yet resides. The remains were accompanied by Victoria, his sister. Mr. Mortson was a faithful employe, popular and honest man."

CANADIAN MAGAZINE.

There are two important and distinctively Canadian articles in the September Canadian Magazine. Dawson As It Is describes the rise and growth of that new city of the north—a mosquito-haunted muskeg in 1896, now a town with seven or eight thousand inhabitants. This is well illustrated. Cape Breton, Past and Present, by W. L. Grant, a son of Principal Grant of Queen's University, is a splendid piece of descriptive writing. For centuries that island was a battleground where the French and the English struggled for supremacy, and Mr. Grant outlines this struggle in a masterly manner. This is also illustrated with pictures of historical spots about Louisbourg, and with charming bits of characteristic scenery for which the Island is famous. Another article in this issue worthy of special mention is entitled Humming Birds of Ontario, by C. W. Nash, one of the greatest authorities in America on wild life. Professor Adam Shortt writes of An Early Canadian Statesman, and gives a powerful picture of the work done by the Hon. Richard Cartwright and others in the early years of the century in fighting against the forcing of an established church upon the new province of Upper Canada. F. Clifford Smith writes an interesting sketch of L. O. David, Sir Wilfrid Laurier's most trusted friend. There are also some bright stories and the usual current topics on men, affairs and books.
