BARN BURN.

The barn and outbuildings on the farm of Mr. Wm. Washington, lot 30, 2nd con. Vaughan, were burned to the ground Monday morning between 7 and 8 o'clock. The loss will be heavy, though partly covered by insurance. There were burned about 30 acres of oats, 13 tons of hay, 600 bushels of barley, 300 bushels of fall wheat, 2 calves and a number of farm implements. Mr. Washington was insured in the Gore Insurance Company, having \$500 on buildings and \$500 on contents. The origin of the fire is a mystery, though it is thought some person, probably a tramp, slept in the barn during the night.
