**HON. N. C. WALLACE DEAD**

Sorrow and regret are expressed everywhere in the death of Hon. N. Clarke Wallace, at the early age of 57 years. Mr. Wallace had represented West York in the House of Commons for the past 23 years, and his name is familiar not only in this riding but throughout the Dominion of Canada. He was practically a self-made man, having risen from teacher in a country Public School to a position in the Government of his country. For a number of years he sat as a member of the Municipal Council of the township of Vaughan, took an active part in matters in the County Council which body afterwards elected him as Warden. In 1878 he entered the field of politics in the cause of the Conservative party, was elected by a fair majority, and held the seat without interruption up to the time of his death. In the Orange Order he rose from secretary of his local lodge to Grand Sovereign of British North America, to which office he was elected for many consecutive years.

Mr. Wallace was a strong party man and a skillful politician. He had great faith in the Conservative party, but in 1895 he broke away from the Mackenzie Bowell Administration when that Government tried to force Separate Schools on the people of Manitoba against the wishes of the Province. In debate he was a forceful speaker, he struck his opponents hard, yet his force of character, his indomitable energy combined with other qualities could not fail to command the admiration of his fellow countrymen, and won for him a warm place in the affections of the people with whom he came in contact.

In private life he was companionable and never was he known to disappoint his friends in filling engagements which often meant much sacrifice to his own comfort and convenience. In fact although these qualities are commendable there is little doubt they shortened his life and hastened him to an early grave. In the natural course of events he would have been spared for many years to take part in the affairs of his country. But this was not permitted. He was taken away in the prime of life and his death is the cause of deep gloom in the village of Woodbridge which for many years has been inseparably connected with the name of Wallace. The sorrow is deeply felt by a large circle of friends, but what must it be in the home of his bereaved widow, four sons and three daughters.

**RASH STATEMENTS.**

The Markham Sun last week contained the following editorial note: "Scurrilous reports are frequently circulated throughout the riding to the effect that Henry Duncan will not contest East York in the next local general election. These reports are all based on rumor. It would, no doubt, be an agreeable occurrence to Mr. Duncan's opponents. They feel his strength too much for them and his retirement would be hailed with delight."

Surely the Sun must be in error. "Scurrilous" means using abusive and indecent language. It is true it was reported some time ago that Mr. Duncan might not be the Conservative candidate owing to injuries received by a kick from his horse, but a report of this kind would not likely be clothed in insulting or offensive

language. And we would be sorry to share in the Sun's belief that Mr. Duncan's opponents are rejoicing in his misfortune. We believe it would puzzle the Sun to mention a man in East York—whose name would be worth repeating—who has circulated "scurrilous" reports about Mr. Duncan's retirement. There has certainly been considerable opposition to Mr. Duncan in the Conservative ranks, but we have never heard of anything of a scurrilous nature.

The East Toronto Standard in discussing East York politics says: "Mr. Richardson, although receiving the party nomination in the regular way, is regarded by some Liberals as being very selfish, more especially so, it is said, by County Councillor Lea, who wants the nomination himself." We believe that in circulating the above rumor the Standard is doing County Councillor Ley an injustice. Mr. Ley was one of those gentlemen nominated at the East York Liberal Convention, but retired in favor of the present Member after speaking of him in the highest terms. Had Mr. John Richardson felt inclined to retire Mr. Ley would have made a most desirable candidate. But as Mr. Ley did not allow his name to go to a vote his many friends will be loath to believe he is now seeking the nomination.

A sad fatality occurred in Toronto a few days ago when a nine year old boy accidentally shot and killed his little niece, only nineteen months' old, in its mother's arms. Little wonder is it that at the inquest the jury strongly censured the father for gross negligence in leaving the rifle loaded in the dining-room where the children could play with it. Of course the boy didn't know the gun was loaded, and the father seemed to find consolation for his carelessness by the plea that he didn't take a newspaper, and therefore never heard of any shooting fatalities.

At the General Elections in the Province of Nova Scotia last week the Liberals almost made a clean sweep. Out of 38 seats the Liberals carried 36 and the Conservatives only two. This is one of the most decisive victories in the history of Canadian politics.
