UNKIND AND INOPPORTUNE.

All classes of people from both sides of politics have expressed sincere regret in the death of Hon. N. C. Wallace. Men who opposed him in various contests were ready to sink all differences in the hour of death, and to remember only his kindness of heart and other commendable qualities. Few men would think of entering the house of the bereaved family at such a time in order to advance their political influence, much less to thrust a knife into their professed friends. Yet that is what the World newspaper has done. On the morning after Mr. Wallace's death The World, whose e litor-in-chief is Mr. W. F. Maclean, M. P., contained an editorial under the heading of "A Tragedy in Politics," from which the following is taken:

"Clarke Wallace died, so the doctors tell us, of pernicious anaemia. He also died of a broken heart. And what broke Clarke Wallace's heart was two things:

"First, the discovery that there was no room in the Conservative party for a member of Parliament in Canada who was of strong Protestant and British principles, disposed to as sert the same, and

"Second, the still more painful discovery that there were men in the Orange Order, leaders in it like himself, who, while professing the principles which he held dear, were ready and willing to desert these principles to keep the Conservative party in office."

The World first charges the Conservative party, and secondly members of the Orange order, with Mr. Wallace's death. There may have been differences between Mr. Wallace and the above bodies. About these we have nothing to say. But we know that Mr. Wallace with all his success had too much spirit to die of a broken heart. And we know that, to raise the question at this particular time shows a lack of feeling and human sympathy.
