COMPLAINT (?) AGAINST LAURIER.

Before Sir Wilfrid Laurier was selected as Premier of this country there was a feeling in some quarters that it would not be good policy for this province to have at the head of affairs a Frenchman. It was feared that Quebec would be afforded special favors to the detriment of Ontario. According to the Mail and Empire of Monday the reverse is the case. The Mail publishes an article intended to show that not only does Mr. Laurier's premiership not aid French Canadians, but that the Premier has actually failed in his duty to Quebec. The following is the article, dated 20th of October, and inspired by a speech made by Mr. F. D. Monk, the French Conservative leader:

"F. D. Monk, the French Conservative leader, made a rather notable speech before a meeting of the Morin Club held last evening. Mr. Monk combated the pretensions of the Liberals that the French-Canadians were bound to support Laurier because he was a French Canadian. Looking at things from a French-Canadian view, he considered it a distinct loss to have a French-Canadian Premier. The French-Canadians gained nothing materially in having a man of their own race at the head of the Government. In the distribution of patronage they had received less than ever, and their influence in the country at large had been considerably diminished.

By the very nature of his position Sir Wilfrid Laurier was obliged every day to make concessions. In the same way when the subsidies to the provinces came up for consideration Prince Edward Island received a bonus. New Brunswick will also receive one, but Quebec's claims are left without consideration. The same thing applied to experimental farms. Every other province had one, but Quebec was left out. In the Immigration Department, conducted by Mr. Sifton, the French-Canadians were practically eliminated. The immigration was directed to the Far West, to the detriment of Quebec.

Referring to Montreal harbor works, Mr. Monk said that the necessary works have been delayed for years simply because the Government is afraid to do anything for the Province of Quebec, which gives Canada its Prime Minister. All along the line Mr. Monk claimed that Quebec province had gained nothing, but, on the contrary, had lost in prestige and advantages by having one of its own sons at the head of the Government."

A recent number of The East Toronto Standard contained the following:

"It is the current rumor that Mr. Duncan will retire, owing to ill health, the result of a recent accident. If he does, why not nominate our worthy warden? 'Big Jim' appears to be the most popular Conservative in the riding."

No doubt the "Big Jim" referred to is Mr. James Chester, warden of York county. If the above rumor were true there would be reason to believe that the Conservatives of East York are fickle. After years of hard work looking after the voters lists and the interests of the party in general Mr. Moyes was turned down, and the nomination given to Mr. Henry Duncan. Surely it is not now proposed to place a third party over Mr. Moyes' head.

The Mail and Empire on Monday stated that the Ontario Legislature would meet in a few weeks—in November or December. On the same day Premier Ross announced that the House will be called together early in January. The statements are conflicting but time will likely reveal the fact that the latter date will be correct.

Montreal Butter & Cheese Association.

At a general meeting of the above Association held on the 10th of October, it was resolved to issue a circular to the Dairymen of Canada, strongly advising them to turn their attention to butter more generally, and to discontinue the manufacture of cheese entirely after 1st November, for the following reasons:—

1st. That fodder cheese hurts the consumption, thus diminishing the demand for grass goods and lowering its price.

2nd. That the outlet for cheese is limited, and everything depends on the quality to induce a large consumption.

3rd. That the consumption of cheese is not increasing, but diminishing, while the consumption of finest creamery butter is rapidly growing.

4th. That the price of butter is higher on an average all the year round than cheese, for the finest qualities.

5th. That the manufacture of butter is more profitable than cheese, not only in the comparative price, but in that the farm stock and the land are better sustained.

6th. That in order to maintain high prices, there must be a continuous supply of finest butter, and as the flow of milk is lessening now, it is most urgent that the quantity should be kept up as much as possible, and to divert the milk from cheese to this article is the only way to keep up the supply.

Butter should be shipped fresh weekly to command the best price. It is recommended that all factories should be fitted so as to make either cheese or butter. Cheese should be held three weeks at a temperature of 60° to ensure proper curing. Serious complaints continue to come of cheese being shipped much too green. Package both of cheese and butter are still made of much too thin wood.
