The boy afterwards asked if he might go home with Mr. Hislop and stay all night, saying he was looking for employment. Mr. Hislop took him home, gave him supper, bed and breakfast. After breakfast Mr. Hislop went to the barn and the boy rode away. Shortly afterwards Mr. Hislop's sister observed that a trunk upstairs was open and becoming suspicious informed her brother. The latter found at once that \$54 in mixed bank bills had been taken from the trunk. He suspected the boy, came hurriedly out to this village, and overtook the lad about a mile and a half south of this place. The boy at once handed Mr. Hislop \$54 which he said he had stolen. He was brought back and tried before Mr. Teefy, J. P., and Reeve Savage yesterday afternoon. The prisoner made no defence and was committed to stand trial. Later in the evening Mr. Brownlee took him to the Toronto jail. To the constable he also acknowledged stealing the bicycle from St. Michael's College. The boy gave his name as John Thompson.

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
