## Dividing Yonge St.

For some time past the municipal-  
ities of Markham and Vaughan have  
been considering a division of Yonge  
St. between the two townships, but as  
yet have come to no agreement. If  
both municipalities are satisfied that  
each should work separately, there  
should be no difficulty in making the  
division. For instance let Markham  
divide the eight miles, allowing  
Vaughan the choice, or vice versa.

The following article in last week's  
Leader and Recorder is one version of  
the case:

"A few years ago the County Council  
abolished the toll roads throughout  
the county and gave the leading roads  
over to the different municipalities to  
maintain. In the case of Yonge St.  
those municipalities which had the  
above street for a boundary line were  
to maintain it jointly, each paying  
half the cost of maintenance. Now,  
Markham township were not satisfied  
to pay half the cost with Vaughan  
and wanted them to divide it. They  
were willing to take over a portion of  
the south end and keep it in repair,  
and Vaughan was to control the bal-  
ance. Last November Markham coun-  
cil met our township council at Vel-  
lore the dividing of the above street.  
The number of miles between the two  
townships is eight. Markham propo-  
sed to take over 3 1/2 miles at the south  
end and Vaughan to take 4 1/2 miles at  
the north end. Our council could not  
agree with Markham to divide it in  
this manner, and another meeting  
was arranged to meet Markham at  
Richmond Hill. On November 22nd  
our council went over, but they could  
not come to an understanding as  
Markham still adhered to their former  
proposition. Then our council made  
their proposition, which was that  
Markham should take 3 1/2 miles at the  
south end, and Vaughan would take  
4 1/2 miles at the north end. To this  
Markham would not agree, and then  
Vaughan gave them the choice as to  
which end they would take, and they  
still refused to listen to Vaughan, and  
wanted it all their own way. We un-  
derstand that they had another meet-  
ing at Richmond Hill and have come  
to no settlement yet."

## News Notes.

Dr. Geo. W. Jackson, who had practised  
as a physician at Eglinton for the  
past 25 years, died Friday last. He  
was 51 years of age.

Rev. Canon Osler, for many years  
rector of St. John's church, York Mills,  
passed away on Saturday at the ad-  
vanced age of 87 years. Interment  
took place at York Mills on Tuesday.

Rev. Father Ryan, Dean of St.  
Michael's Cathedral, Toronto, died  
Saturday afternoon at St. Michael's  
Hospital. Deceased was only 58 years  
of age.

On the 7th of March the Boers under
