MARTER OR NESBITT.

It is safe to say those Conservatives who place party before country will from this time forward have little good to say of Mr. G. F. Marter. Mr. Marter's manifesto to the electors of North Toronto, in last Saturday's dailies, shows that he is tired of extreme partyism, and if re-elected wishes to have a free hand so as to be able to support any measures which in his opinion will be good for this province, and to condemn and vote against any bills which in his judgment would be detrimental to the welfare of our people, no matter from which side of politics the bills may emanate. Mr. Marter has been a member of the Ontario Legislature continuously for the past 16 years. From 1891 to the present time he has been the representative for the North Toronto Conservatives, and previous to Mr. Whitney he was Leader of the Opposition in the Local House. He does not disguise the fact that on several questions during the past two sessions he differed from his party, but states that in his opinion "extreme partyism in Provincial politics is neither desirable nor wise, but on the contrary is often positively foolish and injurious." Mr. Marter thinks that Toronto should receive more consideration from the Legislature than that city has received, but apparently blames the Conservative Opposition more than the Government, saying that "persistent and factious opposition to the Government has in a great measure brought about if not a spirit of retaliation on the part of the Government and their supporters, at least a feeling of indifference that has been very prejudicial."

Mr. Marter praises the Ross Government for opening up New Ontario, for building the Temiskaming Railway, and for bringing in a measure aiming at the prohibition of the liquor traffic, and states that "at the great cost of dissociating myself from my party I have supported the Government in those measures."

Mr. Marter may as well make up his mind that he is "out of it" as far as the North Toronto Conservatives are concerned. He is not built on the right model for them, but apparently they will experience no difficulty in getting the kind of man to their taste. East Friday night, about the time Mr. Marter's manifesto was being set in type, Dr. W. Beattie Nesbitt gave a banquet at Webb's restaurant to about 100 of "The Boys," and judging by the speeches reported in The World the above named gentleman made a high bid for the party nomination. Mr. Alex. Patterson, one of the speakers, advised the four Toronto constituencies to choose representatives who would "stand by the party," and said that "Dr. Nesbitt filled the bill to a nicety." They wanted, said the speaker, "a man who would remain loyal to his party, and not go back on it as Mr. Marter had done." Mr. C. C. Robinson referred to Mr. Marter as a traitor, saying he would not get his vote whether he ran as a Liberal, an Independent or a Conservative. The remarks of the previous speakers encouraged Dr. Nesbitt, the lion of the hour, to strike out boldly. He said that "if he was a candidate in North Toronto he was prepared to do what he had done for others, and that was to win. Their duty as Conservatives was to keep the work going here, and keep the city Tory, no matter what happened."

Both Mr. Marter and Dr. Nesbitt have spoken plainly so as to be easily understood, and the electors at the nomination should have no difficulty in making their choice. The one pledges himself to vote for good measures. The other will vote Tory "no matter what happens."

The Christian Guardian last week takes the ground that in the coming referendum it will not matter whether the liquor party vote or not. The Guardian says that to win, the temperance vote must be 213,500, and that if this number is reached it matters not how small or how large the liquor vote may be. That is a mistake. The prohibition party not only have to get 213,500 votes, but this also must be larger than the vote of the liquor men.
