REMOVAL OF GARBAGE.

This is the time of year when citizens are supposed to begin cleaning up their back yards, lanes and premises generally. The amount of accumulation of refuse and garbage during a winter is enormous, and from a sanitary standpoint, as well as for other reasons, this should be all carted away, and every place thoroughly cleansed. To see that places are kept clean is the duty of the Board of Health, and all good citizens will comply with reasonable requests as nearly as possible. To gather up bones and bottles and rubbish of all kinds is not difficult, but to those who have not horses, the carting of it away to a suitable dumping-ground is often a greater problem.

If individual house-holders had to hire horses to haul away their accumulations the cost would be considerable, but if done by a corporation the cost would be little. In many cities and towns ashes and refuse from hotels, factories and business houses are removed by the municipal officials, and the cost is considered money well spent.

If in a municipality like Richmond Hill the Village Council would give notice that at a certain time carts or wagons would be provided for hauling away rubbish placed in barrels or boxes, we have no doubt that in some cases accumulations of the past ten years would be taken away. A man with a team of horses and a wagon for a couple of days would doubtless haul away tons of stuff that otherwise will be left piled up in back yards year after year, and the increase in taxes would be imperceptible. Surely the experiment is worth a trial.
