"THE GREAT MORAL ISSUE."

The Mail and Empire on Friday last contained an editorial of about a column in length headed "The Great Moral Issue." The object of the article was to show that in elections when ordinary questions are being discussed the clergy refrain from taking any part, but that when the moral welfare and political liberties of the people are at stake, as they are in this campaign, even the ministers of the gospel must speak out. The Mail says that the rectitude of the rulers are involved in this issue and proceeds as follows: "In the face of such an issue there need be no wonder that clergymen such as Rev. Peter Campbell, who spoke with Mr. Whitney at Aurora on Wednesday, should feel impelled to come forward and declare strongly in behalf of the right."

People of ordinary intelligence and observation must have considerable difficulty in repressing a smile when they read such twaddle as the article referred to. Rev. Peter Campbell who formerly preached at Maple, but is now without a church, has been on the political stump for several years past. He has received every consideration from the press and political opponents although he lays himself open to criticism as other political stumbers do. Rev. Peter Campbell never fails to impress his hearers with the fact that he is a "minister". At Aurora a few nights ago he laid considerable emphasis on that point, claimed the right to speak as a minister, and grew quite eloquent when he referred to the temperance question as a great moral issue. Rev. Peter Campbell ridiculed the referendum and Hon. G. W. Ross' position on the temperance question, although the Premier has pledged his government to enforce a prohibitive measure if half the electors who vote at an ordinary political election will show that they desire such a measure. In the face of this Rev. Peter Campbell takes the platform and supports Mr. Whitney who declared himself against prohibition.

THE LIBERAL, however, must not be misunderstood in this matter. We do not wish to give the impression that the Rev. Peter Campbell is opposed to prohibition and other moral questions. We believe that Rev. Peter Campbell would support any temperance or moral question that may be advocated and introduced by Mr. Whitney or the Conservative party.

A prohibition rally was held in the Orange Hall, Woodbridge, on Tuesday evening, and according to published reports Mr. W. J. Hill, M. P. P., was at that meeting placed on what is known as the black list, because he had "opposed by his vote and influence the unanimous requests of the prohibition convention." May the temperance people not be making a mistake in going to such a length? Mr. Hill supports a political party that has made great reforms in intoxicating liquor laws during the past thirty years. Mr. Hill at the last session of the Legislature voted to give this province prohibition as soon as it was seen to be backed up by public opinion. Every Conservative member in the House with the exception of Mr. Marter, voted against this prohibition measure. Some temperance people seem to think that prohibition should be obtained simply by a wave of the hand.

The tremendous expense of the Boer war is given as the cause for the proposal to place customs duties on certain articles in Britain. The chancellor of the exchequer proposes to increase the income tax to the extent of a penny a pound, and to impose a duty of threepence a hundredweight on grain, and five pence a hundredweight on flour and meal. The income tax is at present fourteen pence to the pound, which increased by another penny will make the tax equal to about six per cent. This new move looks like the thin end of the wedge in England's return to protection. No doubt this will be widely discussed during the next few months.

Dr. Beattie Nesbitt on Monday evening received the nomination of the Conservatives of North Toronto. Dr. Egerton Ryerson and Mr. John Shaw also allowed their names to go before the convention but Dr. Nesbitt won in the first ballot. Mr. Marter, the late member, was referred to as the man who betrayed and deserted the party, and therefore not entitled to any consideration from the hands of the North Toronto Conservatives. If North Toronto wants a man to represent them in Parliament who will keep burning at a white heat the fire of race and religious prejudice they cannot do better than elect Dr. Beattie Nesbitt.

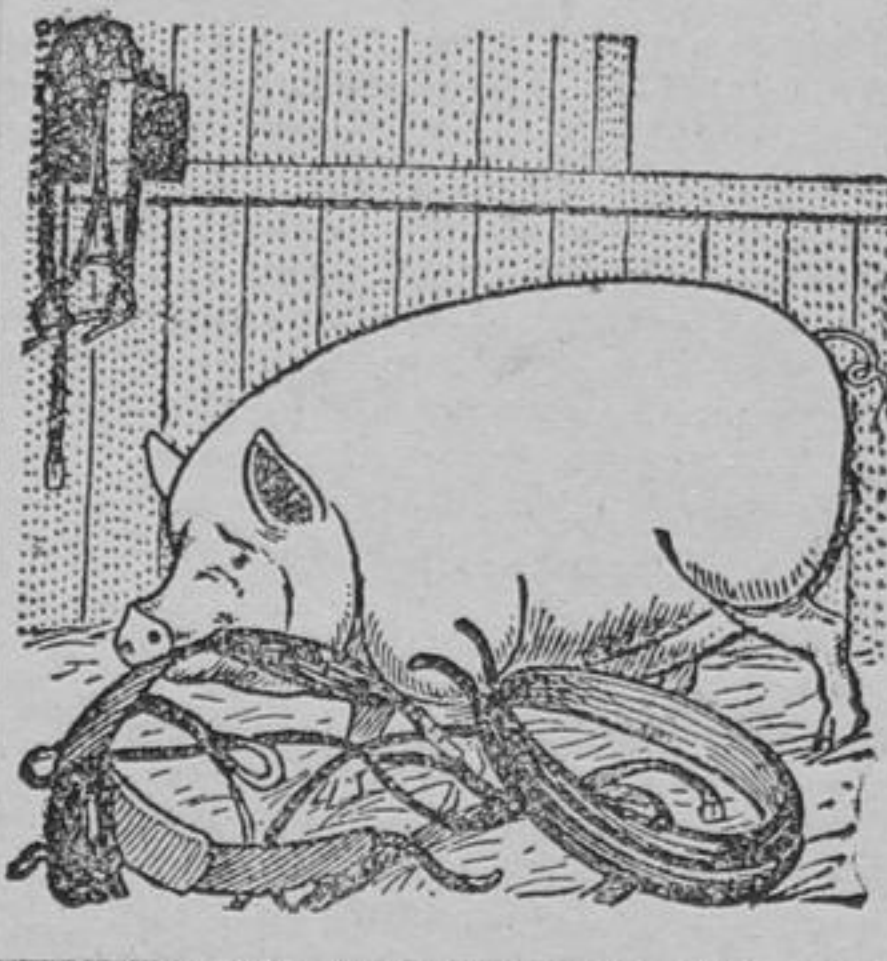
