Orillia Asylum.

The following letter is from Mr. C. E. Sheppard, government electrician in the Orillia Asylum, formerly of this place:

TO THE EDITOR OF THE LIBERAL: DEAR SIR,—I have just about completed the wiring of these Government buildings, although I have yet considerable work to do. I have spent a very pleasant winter, having had very little experience of cold or snow, not requiring to go out of doors from Monday morning until Saturday night. It takes about five tons of coal per day to heat this institution. I find the people here more friendly and sociable than those of the city. This must be a very pleasant place in summer. It appears to have been a wilderness converted into a Paradise, on the shores of Lake Simcoe, opposite Strawberry Island. These buildings cover about five acres, and there are thirty acres of lawns to be kept mown. When one gang of patients tire, another is put on the same machine. You may pass through the dining-room where 600 patients are at their meals and you would hear less noise and confusion than one half of sane people would make, for the simple reason that many of them never spoke a word in their life. The death rate here is about seven per month, and the patients are buried by contract. They call it "going to the sand pit." I never saw a funeral since I have been here. The only thing that I see small about the Ross Government is the salaries they pay their employees. They have promised us a raise of one dollar after three year's service. Yours truly, CHAS. E. 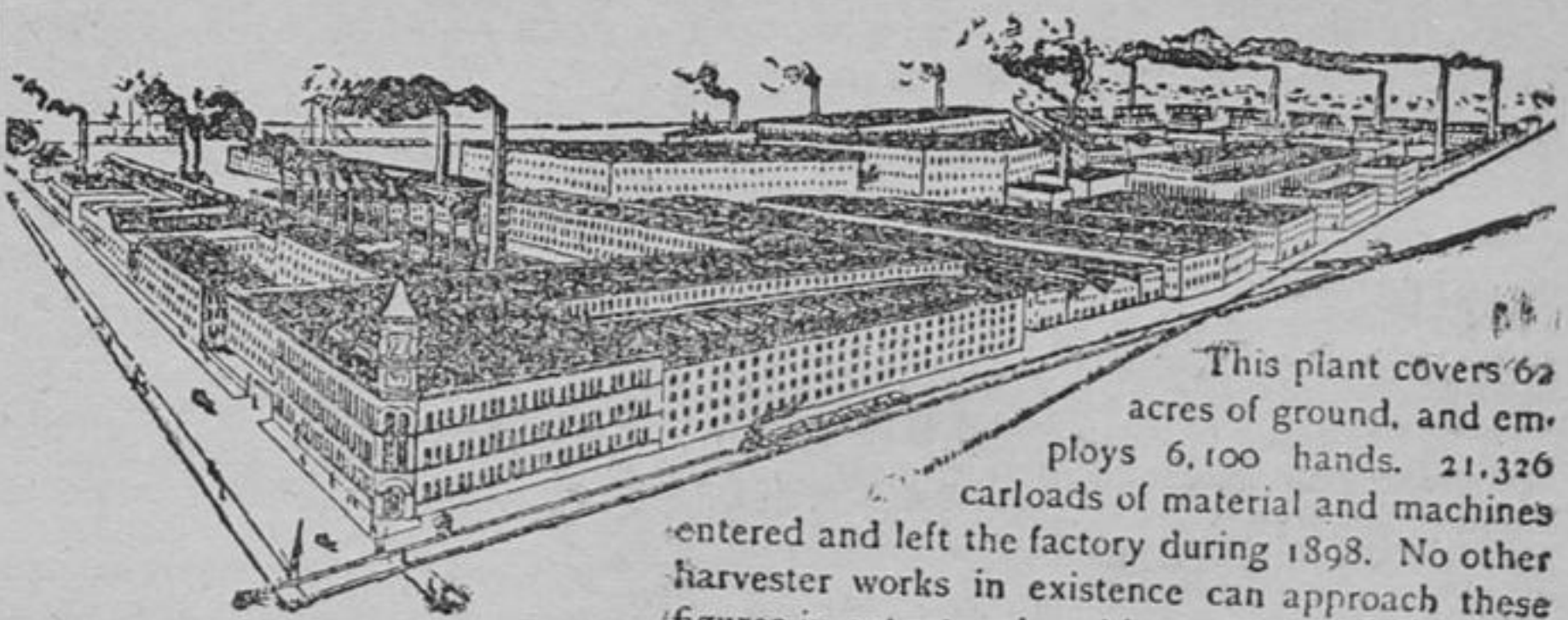

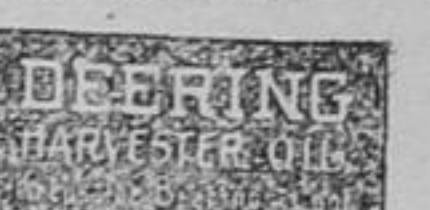
