built. In four years 510 patients have
been treated, and more than 352 have
been cured or so helped that they could
go back to work, caring for wife or child
or those dependent upon them.

The new Free Consumptive Hospital is
situated in Muskoka, not far from the
Muskoka Cottage Sanatorium, the two
gentlemen who have generously borne
the cost of constructing the building de-
siring that the same benefits that have
come to patients of the Muskoka Cottage
Sanatorium, by virtue of its excellent
situation, should go to the poorer patients,
whose only hope is in admittance to the
Free Consumptive Hospital.

All that is wanting now is the furnish-
ing of this Hospital with beds and other
necessary appointments. The National
Sanitarium Association, because of their
heavy debt, are unable to undertake this

Rogers—Armstrong—that the
reeve and councillor Legge be and
are hereby appointed a committee
to examine culvert opposite lot 14,
con. 12 and also roadway opposite lot
25 con. 12 and report to this council at
its next meeting.

Phillips—Legge—that a special
grant of \$40.00 be given towards
graveling the Townline north be-
tween King and East Gwillimbury
in polling div. no. 9 on consideration
that East Gwillimbury grant an
equal amount, and that Norman Wes-
ley be com. for same.

Legge—Rogers—that Major Steph-
enson be and is hereby appointed to
operate the road machine on north side
and William Lloyd on south side
of township. They to furnish two
teams and three men, each at eight
dollars (\$8.00) per day and to com-
mence work at once and not put in
more than six days during the month
of May.

Phillips—Legge—that this coun-
cil hereby ratify the action of reeve
in taking the necessary steps to have
the bill of A. B. Armstrong taxed.

Rogers—Armitage—that a special
grant of \$35.00 be made to improve
road opposite lots 29 and 30, con. 7,
on boundary between polling sub-
divisions 4 and 6 con. 7 and that Walter
Davis S. Pottage and W. H. Proctor
be commissioners.

Legge—Armitage—that a special
grant be given in polling sub-divisions
no. 5 and 7 of \$40.00 to repair hills in
said divisions between lots 10 and 11
con. 8 known as gravel pit hill and

the one west and that Joseph Egan
be appointed com. for div. 5 and Ed.
Archibald for div. 7.

Legge—Armitage—that this coun-
cil cannot entertain the bill of the
Toronto World as presented by them
to A. B. Armstrong and sent to this
council by the said A. B. Armstrong
and that it be returned.

Rogers—Phillips—that the assess-
ors James Black and Malcolm McCallum
be paid the sum of (\$50.00) each
on account.

grant of \$25.00 be made to gravel hill
in polling sub-div. no. 5 opposite lot
15, con. 8, Malcolm Mitchel and Wil-
liam Kerr, coms.
