QUESTION AND ANSWERS.

Certain people in West York claiming to be working in the interest of temperance are considering the advisability of putting a prohibition candidate in the field as they say they are not satisfied with the answers of Mr. W. J. Hill, or Mr. J. W. St. John. The Prohibition League requested from the above named candidates an answer, in writing, to the following question:—

"If elected to the Legislature will you do all you can to secure the enactment and enforcement of the legislation prohibiting the traffic in intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes as far as is within the ascertained power of the Province, even to the extent of voting against your party?"

We print below the answers to allow the electors to see how the candidates stand on the question. Mr. Hill replied as follows:—

"I have already voted for legislation to prohibit the traffic in intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes, so far as is within the ascertained power of the province, and if such legislation be approved by the electors I will do all in my power to secure the proper enforcement of the same."

Mr. St. John answered in the following words:—

"In reply, I beg to state that I have been a total abstainer during my whole life. I will always support honest measures of moral reform and endeavor to lessen the evils of intemperance."

"I regard the Ross referendum as a delusion and a snare; a new creation, vicious in principle, perfidious in design, deceitful in aim, a repudiation of the principle of responsible government, and a monument to the memory of a broken pledge."

It will be observed that Mr. Hill has answered without a quibble, and no intelligent person can doubt where he stands on the question. Mr. St. John is silent on the question asked, namely prohibition, but he is quite eloquent in giving his opinion on the referendum, about which the League did not ask.

INCONSISTENT.

The Mail of Tuesday called upon all Ontario to unite against the Grit machine, saying that "the machine is, of course, aimed at Conservatives and Independents."

Is Mr. Marter not an Independent? And is the so-called machine not supporting Mr. Marter in North Toronto? Mr. Marter is the predecessor of Mr. Whitney, as a leader of the Conservative opposition in Ontario, and only a week or two ago The Mail in a lengthy editorial labored to show the ingratitude of the Liberals of North Toronto in not supporting Dr. Adams whom the paper refers to as "a lifelong, strenuous and wavering supporter of Liberalism," instead of Mr. Marter.

Mr. Marter has frequently been referred to in the columns of The Mail as a traitor during the past few months. And why? Simply because the late Conservative leader would not join with Mr. Whitney in calling the Ross Government a pack of thieves and rogues. The Mail says that the Government gave away for nothing thousands of acres of pulpwood in New Ontario. Mr. Marter said it was the best bargain that could possibly be made, and he therefore voted for the government, and against his party on that important question. Yet The Mail says that the Grit machine is aimed at Conservatives and Independents.

Mr. Arch. Campbell, M. P. for West York, has introduced a bill in the House of Commons to amend the Weights and Measures Act. The three sections are as follows:—

1. When milk is sold by the can, the can shall be considered as equivalent to eight gallons, and the half can to four gallons.
2. Milk cans shall, when presented for verification to any inspector of weights and measures, be inspected and stamped with their capacity as then determined.
3. The Governor in Council may make a tariff of fees to be paid for inspecting and stamping milk cans, but the said fees shall not exceed two cents per gallon.

For the three years in which the law has been in force taxing corporations, such as insurance companies and banks, the Government treasury has received \$683,345.87. This is as Mr. Ross pointed out a few days ago, six times as much money as the Government contributes for the High Schools of the province, yet Mr. Whitney says that if he becomes premier he will repeal this measure. The tax on brewers and distillers has yielded \$188,270, and Mr. Whitney has opposed the taxation.

The Markham Sun last week, apparently in all seriousness, in speaking of the Government said: "Even Mr. N. W. Rowell can lay aside his temperance principles and support Mr. Ross."

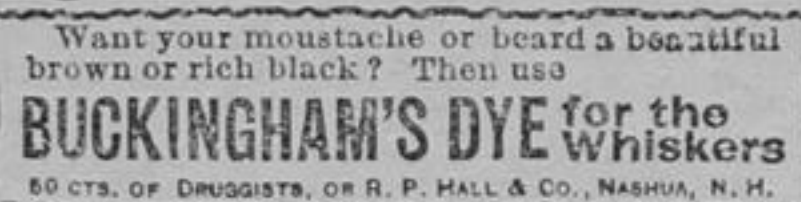
Now, I have reason to believe that Mr. Richardson's record in Parliament will stand criticism, and as for getting a "job" for himself, I believe this is not true.
