Mr. Richardson's Meeting

Mr. John Richardson, the Liberal
candidate for East York, got a warm
reception at the public meeting here
Tuesday evening. There was a good
attendance, the order was all that
could be desired, and speakers on both
sides received a fair hearing. The
chair was occupied by Mr. Andrew
Newton, President of the local Asso-
ciation.

Mr. Richardson was the first speak-
er. Like the other speakers he com-
plimented the meeting on the presence
of so many ladies. He referred to the
fact that the Liberal Governments had
handled over \$113,000,000 in the ad-
ministration of affairs, yet it had never
been shown that one cent had ever
been misappropriated or misapplied.
Ontario's finances had been well man-
aged. At Confederation each of the
provinces started with a clean sheet.
With the exception of Ontario the
other six provinces have now large
debts, while our province has a sur-
plus of \$2,300,000. He referred to
the much-abused Educational System,
which he showed from undisputed
and reliable authorities to be the best
in the world. He touched on many
other points, and asked the electors of
this part to again rally round him on
the 26th of May, and return a support-
er to the ablest and most progressive
government that ever ruled a province.

Mr. T. L. Church, barrister, follow-
ed in support of Mr. Moyes. He stated
that every department of the Govern-
ment was corrupt, and referred to
the leaders as grafters, ballot box
stuffers, ballot burners, etc. The
Government had given away the pulp-
wood in New Ontario for nothing.
Hon. John Dryden was past owner of a
cattle ranch in Dakota, and there was
a ring in school books by which
W. J. Gage & Co., Hunter, Rose &
Co., Buntin, Reid & Co., and others
had grown rich. He spoke of the
West Elgin election frauds, and said
that while other ridings were getting
jails, asylums and other Government
institutions built, John Richardson,
the Liberal candidate, had practically
done nothing for East York. Elect
Mr. Moyes and return Mr. Whitney
and they would improve the Public
Schools where now many children are
ignorant and can scarcely read or
write.

Mr. Wilson of Markham, followed,
and referred to most of Mr. Church's
statements. Mr. Church had found
fault with the scrap iron assessment,
but people would laugh at the idea of
sending Mr. Moyes to Parliament to
tax corporations like the Metropolitan
Railway. He contended that Mr.
Henry Duncan, and not Mr. Moyes,
was the choice of East York Con-
servatives.

Mr. D. Hines of Toronto, also spoke
in favor of Mr. Whitney and Mr.
Moyes. He made the statement that
the present Government had taken
the power away from municipalities
to tax corporations, and assumed that
work themselves. He thought it was
time for a change, as 30 or 34 years
was too long for any government to
rule, as they were sure to get corrupt.
Civil servants were often impertinent
and overbearing when asked proper
questions. Besides when Liberals
were in power at Ottawa, there should
be a different political party in
Ontario. Mr. Whitney would abolish
the office of Minister of Education
and appoint a consultative Board
of such gentlemen as Rev. Father
Teefy and Prof. Goldwin Smith.

Mr. J. G. Ramsden made a tell-
ing speech on behalf of Mr. Richardson.
He referred to the slanderous charges
made on this and other platforms
against the Government, and showed
from the report of Judge Morgan and
two other members of the Commission
that the burning of the ballots in
West Elgin in no way reflected on the
good name of the Government or any
other person. The burning of the
ballots was unimportant as the judges
had already made their scrutiny. In
reply to Mr. Church as to why Mr.
Richardson was holding so many
meetings he said it was to answer the
misrepresentations made by Tory
speakers.

Mr. Frank Anglin, K. C., of Toronto,
closed the meeting by one of the best
and most forcible speeches ever heard
in this place. He regretted having to
take up time in refuting charges of
ballot switching and other forms of
corruption, as nothing of the kind
had been traced to any prominent
Liberal. Not so with the late Con-
servative Government in the Dom-
inion, as Sir Hector Langevin, Minister
of Public Works, was forced to retire
from the Cabinet through proven
corrupt acts. The speaker denied the
charge that children in our Public
schools were unable to read or write.
He reviewed with clearness the Gov-
ernment's policy relating to pulp wood
and timber limits. The Ross Govern-
ment had been selling the timber at
\$2,000 per sq. mile, whereas when the
late Conservative Government thought
they owned New Ontario they were
selling it at only \$5 per sq. mile.

Every charge made was squarely
met, and in conclusion Mr. Anglin
made a strong plea for the return of
Mr. Richardson and the present Gov-
ernment.

The meeting closed with the usual
cheers.

as, when time was called, neither side
had scored.

cession, entertained a number of their
friends from here last Saturday. The

and all thoroughly enjoyed the walk
there and back. A very pleasant
time was spent rowing on the trout
pond, and in other amusements.

Mrs. G. Keffer, and Miss McDonald
had a very narrow escape last Friday
morning while driving to the city.
They had just crossed the bridge on
the 3rd. concession, below Concord,
when it collapsed. If they had been
on it when it went down they might
have been seriously injured.

The sale of cattle on Friday last,
was well attended, and quite a num-
ber were sold.
A valuable horse, belonging to Mr.
A. Dully, died last week of inflam-
mation.
