MISLEADING PAMPHLET.

Conservative literature relating to the alleged sins of omission and commission of the Ross Government seems to be scarce in this section. The only thing which has come under our notice for East York is a pamphlet of some eight or ten blank pages, insinuating that Mr. John Richardson, Ex-M. P., has done nothing during the eight years he was in Parliament, but that "he got a job for himself." The last assertion is altogether without foundation. Mr. Richardson has not asked the Government for a position or job since he has been a Member of the Legislature, and that body has not offered him anything of the kind.

As to Mr. Richardson not doing anything in parliament the charge is untruthful as well as unfair. It would certainly be unfair to gauge the usefulness of a member by the number or length of his speeches. It is well known that outside the members of the Cabinet and two or three others on the same side, and probably three or four speakers on the side of the Opposition, few men take part in long discussions. Scores of other first-class men, however, spend their time on committees and prepare the work for those who are to present cases. In striking the Standing Committees, each chairman wants to get the best men in their respective committees. Mr. Richardson has for several years past been a member of every Standing Committee, except the Legal Committee. This is an honor which has been conferred upon less than half-a-dozen members of the House. He also introduced a number of bills, most of which have become law. Mr. Richardson has a good share of the credit with Hon. John Dryden who introduced as a Government measure the many good clauses in the Ontario Shops Regulation Act. This Act protects children under 10 years of age, girls and women, compels employers to furnish seats for their female employes, looks after sanitary arrangements &c. Mr. Richardson and Hon. Mr. Dryden were in close touch in the preparation and passing of that measure. When the Toronto Street Railway Company and the Council of the Village of East Toronto failed to come to terms for a right of way through the village the Company applied for an Act which if passed would have deprived East Toronto the right to control its own streets. Mr. Richardson stood in the breach and preserved to the village its municipal rights.

The electors of East York will make no mistake in re-electing Mr. Richardson on the 29th inst. He does not shout to the world what he has done, but he is a safe, intelligent and useful member in the Ontario Legislature.

**THE MAIL AND EMPIRE ALONE.**

The Mail and Empire may be said to be the only newspaper in Toronto that is making a hard-fight for Mr. Whitney. The Telegram which has Conservative leanings has had very little to say politically since the election announcement was made; the Evening News is noticeably silent, and even The World has had very little to say since the campaign opened. Some time ago The News in its leading editorial openly shared its preference for Mr. Marter over Dr. Nesbitt in North Toronto, pointing out that both Liberals and Conservatives would vote for the former because "Mr. Marter has always been ready to stand up for the interests of Toronto, and that as an Independent

he could give the municipality better service than he could if he were under the orders of a leader." The News raps Dr. Nesbitt over the knuckles by saying that "if he loses it will simply be because the electors prefer a man of Mr. Marter's experience, who, they think can be trusted to take the side of the city without regard to the attitude of his party."

There is no love between Mr. Whitney and Mr. W. F. Maclean, and this is probably one reason why The World is not showing as much vigor as usual. On the 7th of May The World contained a rather cutting article about "Cleaning Out the Old Well," alleging that the Grits had fallen from grace, but even in this article it was pointed out that the past record of The Liberals of this country was one to be proud of in comparison with that of the Tory party. The first paragraph read as follows:—

"If you are a Liberal, recall the history of the Liberal, or, rather, the Reform party, in this country. William Lyon Mackenzie, George Brown, Baldwin, Alexander Mackenzie, Blake, were of this school. Whatever their weaknesses, there was one marked characteristic of their public record: they fought in season and out of season to protect the rights of the people and to widen the rights of the people. They and the Reform party fought against the old Family Compact; they fought to have municipal institutions, and, once obtained, to improve their usefulness to the people; they demanded, and aided in securing, in a measure, representation by population; they opposed a union of church and state; they improved land tenure in Lower Canada; and in other respects they declared themselves to be the party of the people and the party of progress, as against the Tories, or the party of reaction"

**UNMANLY MEANS.**

Next to the Mail and Empire the Leader and Recorder, which is supporting Mr. St. John in West York, is carrying on one of the most contemptible fights against an honorable political opponent in the person of Mr. W. J. Hill. Mr. Hill by industry, perseverance and integrity with a limited education, has raised himself from an ordinary laboring mechanic to a successful contractor, and few men can be found, either Liberal or Conservative, who do not feel pleased to know of his success. The breath of suspicion, has never gone out against his public or private acts. And yet The Leader and Recorder, for political purposes, would meanly stoop to besmirch his good name on the eve of an election. Last week that paper devoted much space in hinting that Mr. Hill was not a safe man to have in Parliament because he had secured building contracts in New Ontario. The following is a sample paragraph:—

"Canada for the Canadians!" shouts Mr. Hill, as he pockets the fat profits on the Clergue syndicate contracts, and, incidentally, pays out \$65,000 in wages. This is about the most comfortable way of being up against the big corporations that we know of. What the already overburdened taxpayer thinks about it is another question."

Why speak of the "already overburdened taxpayer?" His taxes will not be increased by Mr. Hill securing honest contracts in building in our province. Mr. Hill and the Liberal party have collected from the "big corporations" referred to over \$300,000 in the past three years. Does this not lighten the poor man's taxes? Yet Mr. Whitney says publicly that if he becomes Premier he will repeal this law which taxes corporations. And Mr. J. W. St. John and the Leader and Recorder are working hand in hand with Mr. Whitney. There is danger ahead for the Province that elects a Government by such unfair, deceitful and miserable tactics, and honest and intelligent electors are not likely to run the risk on the 29th of this month.
