CHIME CLOCK.

Probably the greatest attraction in time-pieces and the finest workmanship ever attempted in this place may now be seen in Mr. Jerry Smith's jewelry shop. It is an eight-day quarter hour chime clock, manufactured by Mr. Smith himself. The only parts that he did not make are the bells, the pendulum and the case. The case was made by L. Innes & Sons, and is a credit to the firm. It is made from quarter cut white oak, neatly matched, and there is a plate glass door in front of dial and pendulum. The clock chimes the Westminster chimes. It has brass movement, and all the pinions, arbors and racks are cut from Stubbs steel and tempered. The dial is made of hard rolled brass, and the figures are brass (Arabic pattern) and set in a circular recess. The hands are scroll, cut from steel, and have a polished brass star fixed into wide part. The clock beats once per second, chimes at each quarter, and strikes at full hour. The time drum contains "maintaining power," which enables the clock to continue running during the process of winding. Without this the second hand would move backwards while the winding took place. The total height of the clock is 8 feet 2 inches. It took a year and four months to construct the clock during the proprietor's spare time. We are not prepared to say this clock is for sale, but it will be worth any person's while to call at Mr. Smith's shop to see its construction, and hear its melodious chimes.
