Ross Government Sustained

Liberals elected, 51. Conservatives elected, 46. Manitoulin yet to hear from. Every Minister re-elected. The four Torontos go Whitney. Richardson (Lib.) returned for East York; Davis (Lib.) for North York; St. John (Con.) West York. J. P. Whitney elected for Dundas. New Ontario goes with the Government.

Court of Revision

Pursuant to notice the Court of Revision assembled in the council chamber at 8 o'clock p. m. on May 27. Members present: Messrs Savage, Furey, Hill, Innes and Trench, who made and subscribed their oaths of office and took their seats. The members took up the Assessment Roll for 1902. Mr. J. L. Jenkins addressed the court on behalf of his appeal from the assessment of the property entered in his name, as being assessed "too high" and requested the removal of his name and insertion of the name of Mrs. N. R. Carmichael of Kingston, as owner. Moved by Mr. Innes, seconded by Mr. Furey, that the property assessed to Mr. Jenkins be reduced to \$60, and that the name of Mrs. N. R. Carmichael be inserted as owner, at Mr. Jenkins' request. Carried. Moved by Mr. Trench, seconded by Mr. Hill that the following changes be made in the Assessment Roll viz: James Millington, instead of James and Thomas Freck. John Reid instead of Thomas Young. Jarvis, Wilson, instead of Jane Rowley. Andrew Martin, instead of James McKenzie. A. Hopkins, to be assessed for Mrs. Hennessey's, 2 acre lot. James Carnegie, instead of Mrs. Hennessey, for house. Armand Savage to be entered for Manhood Franchise. Nicholas Major, jointly with Daniel Reiman. Bitch assessed to T. Ludford be struck off the Roll, and the foregoing changes being made the Assessment Roll be now passed as finally revised and corrected. Carried. The court adjourned. M. TEEFY, clerk.

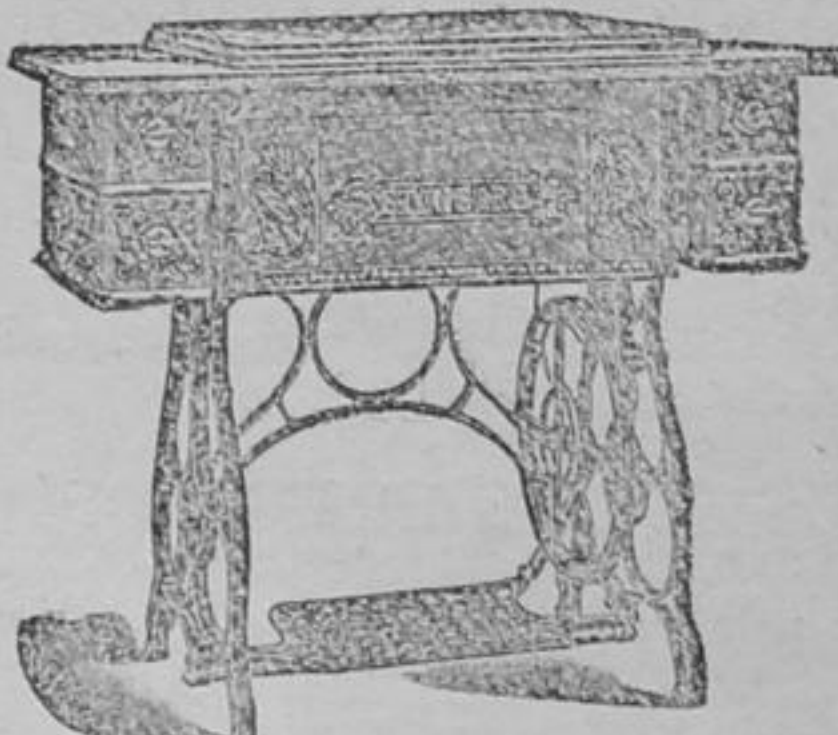
