THE MAIL'S HYPOCRISY.

The Mail and Empire still keeps repeating its miserable charges against Hon. G. W. Ross and his colleagues, charges that are utterly without foundation. The Tories are being continually referred to as paragons of purity, while the Grits are branded as a pack of thieves and dishonest blacklegs. Monday's edition is a fair sample of what the Mail dishes up to its readers day after day. That paper speaks of the one side as having "clean Government candidates," while their opponents are "the machine nominees." Again it is said the result of the recent election is "a condemnation of the machine of the most overwhelming and startling character." This The Mail is not ashamed to say though the Ross Government at time of writing has a majority of three, and every member of the cabinet was returned by a large majority.

Further on the Mail says: "Liberals in principle are coalescing with their Conservative friends to bring about reform and establish free government for the masses. The movement that has been forced upon Liberals is bound to go on, because it is founded on righteousness, and is directed against an evil that is offensive to the people and dangerous to the state."

The Mail's reference to "righteousness" sounds like sacrilege, and reminds one of a man who will shout "purity" with his lips, while with his hands he will be picking people's pockets.

When the courts settle down to work it may be shown that there has been some crookedness on one side or the other, or on both sides, but so far there is no reason to say that the elections were not conducted honestly. The Liberals have as much reason to talk about a Conservative machine as the Conservatives have to talk of a Liberal machine. But this kind of talk is foolish, and those who stoop to such tactics have no regard for the good name of our country. The policy of scandal and slander is a poor policy to place before the electors, a policy that will do little to fit the young men of this province for the duties of citizenship. If the Liberal party has secured a majority in the recent elections they won fairly by placing before the electors the policy of the Government. Not so with the other side who resorted to misrepresentation, endeavoring to show the irregularities in West Elgin three or four years ago were committed with the knowledge of Mr. Ross and his colleagues, whereas the crooked work was done by overzealous individuals for whose actions the party could not be held responsible.

Let us here repeat, the Ross government is now in the lead, and The Mail may just as well try to make the best of it and look pleasant.

PEACE AT LAST.

The joyful news has at last been spread that peace has been declared in South Africa after a cruel war lasting two years and seven months. The terms may not suit those people who would exact the last ounce of flesh. The terms are

such, however, that a repetition of the struggle would be next to impossible, so let us hope that peace and honor have come together. The following are leading conditions in the terms of peace:—

The burgher forces lay down their arms, and hand over all the rifles, guns and ammunition of war in their possession or under their control.

All prisoners are to be brought back as soon as possible to South Africa, without loss of liberty or property.

No action to be taken against prisoners, except where they are guilty of breaches of the rules of war.

Dutch is to be taught in the schools, if desired by the parents, and used in the courts, if necessary.

Rifles are allowed for protection.

Military occupation is to be withdrawn as soon as possible and self-government substituted.

There is to be no tax on the Transvaal to pay the cost of the war.

The sum of three million sterling (\$15,000,000) is to be provided for restocking the Boers' farms.

Rebels are liable to trial, according to the law of the colony to which they belong. The rank and file will be disfranchised for life. The death penalty will not be inflicted.

The World is making itself ridiculous these days. On the Saturday previous to the elections it contained the following in large headlines: "To-day the certainty is that Mr. Whitney will sweep the Province." As this "sweep" did not materialize The World assumes that the "machine" has been at work again, and that the wickedest tricks have been played upon the innocent Tories. In Oakville it is claimed that Grits were supplied with a black pencil with which to mark their ballots, while Tories were given a blue one, and "it is rumored the latter were not counted." The World endeavored on Monday to startle its readers with rubbish like the following:—

"The desperate frauds resorted to in Hamilton by the machine are without a parallel in the history of the province. In practically every sub-division in West Hamilton a number of ballot papers were supplied to the deputy returning officers, and by them handed to the voters, from which the name of Mayor Hendrie, the Conservative candidate, had been omitted. This is the most brazen fraud yet resorted to by the machine."

Where were the Conservative scrutineers when the alleged bogus ballots were given to simple voters in the second city in the province? The charge is absurd. Such a fraud would not take place in the backwoods, let alone in the city of Hamilton.

The World is not calling the Conservative leaders very bad names since the Provincial elections as it was expected it would. Mr. Whitney made a pretty good run for the premiership, and therefore gave Mr. W. F. Maclean little chance to draw his scalping knife. Had Mr. Whitney been beaten by a dozen or more The World would have surely blamed the leader for the result. The World could not refrain, however, from pointing out that with a good leader the result might have been different. The morning after the elections that paper, under the heading, "For Conservatives to think over," contained the following as its leading editorial.

"It is ten years since the Conservatives won anything (except the Manitoba Legislature). They carried the general elections of 1891; Sir John died in that year, and they carried the bye-elections of 1892 resultant, and from that day their star has been on the wane. Some date the fall from 1896, but the real fact to recognize is that 1892 was the last year of Conservative success.

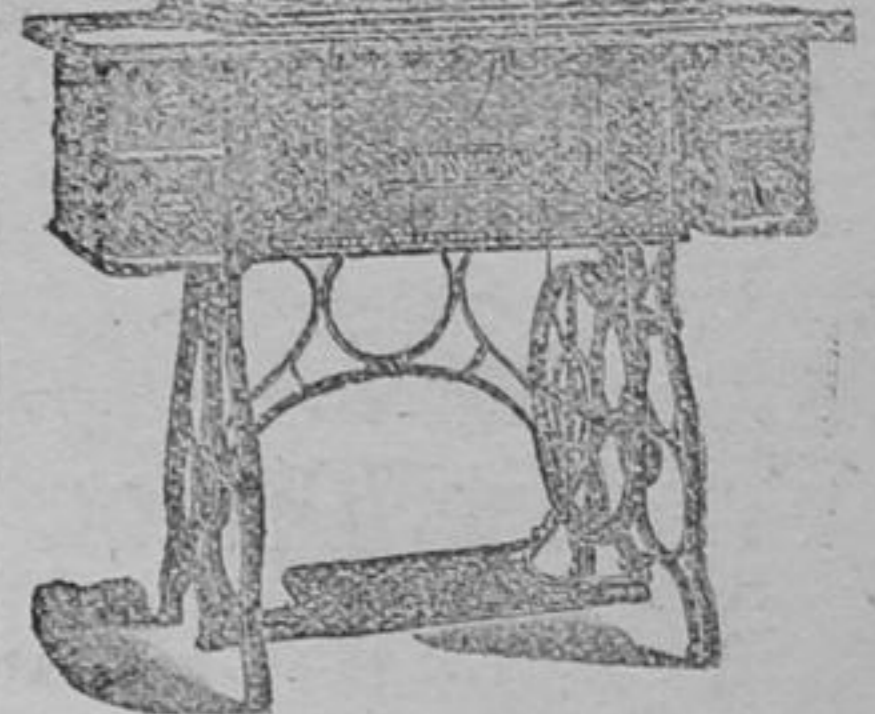

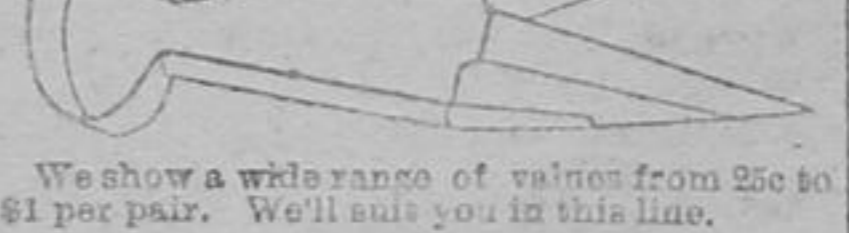

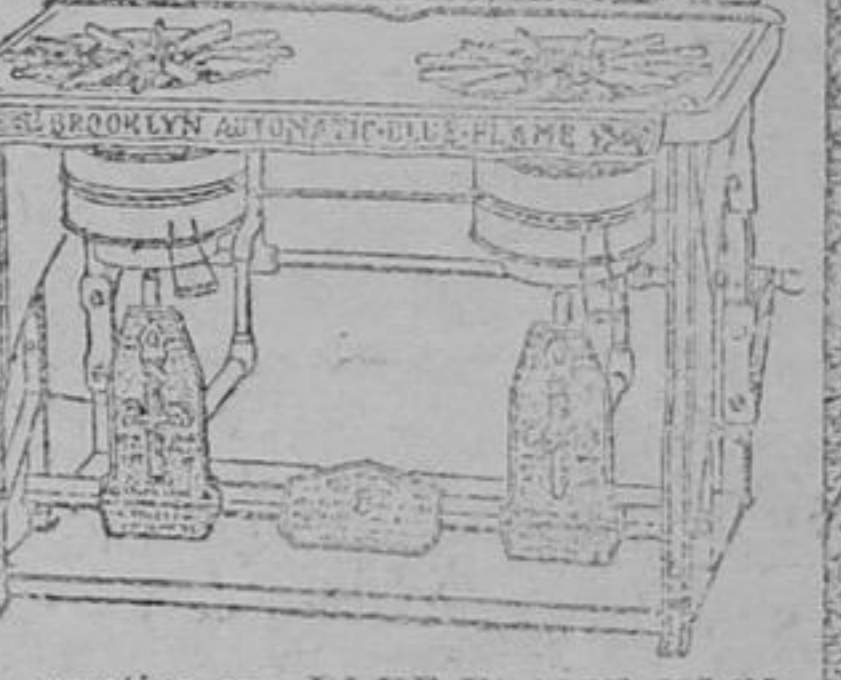
