LIBERALS WIN THREE SEATS.

The Ross Government and the Liberal party in Ontario are to be congratulated on the great victory of yesterday. In the three bye-elections Liberals were returned with substantial majorities. In North Grey A. G. McKay defeated G. M. Boyd by 269; John Brown carried North Perth by 221, defeating J. C. Monteith; and in North Norfolk A. M. Little won from Dr. Snider by a majority of 55. The result is satisfactory after a campaign of slander and misrepresentation carried on by the opponents of Mr. Ross and the Liberal party.

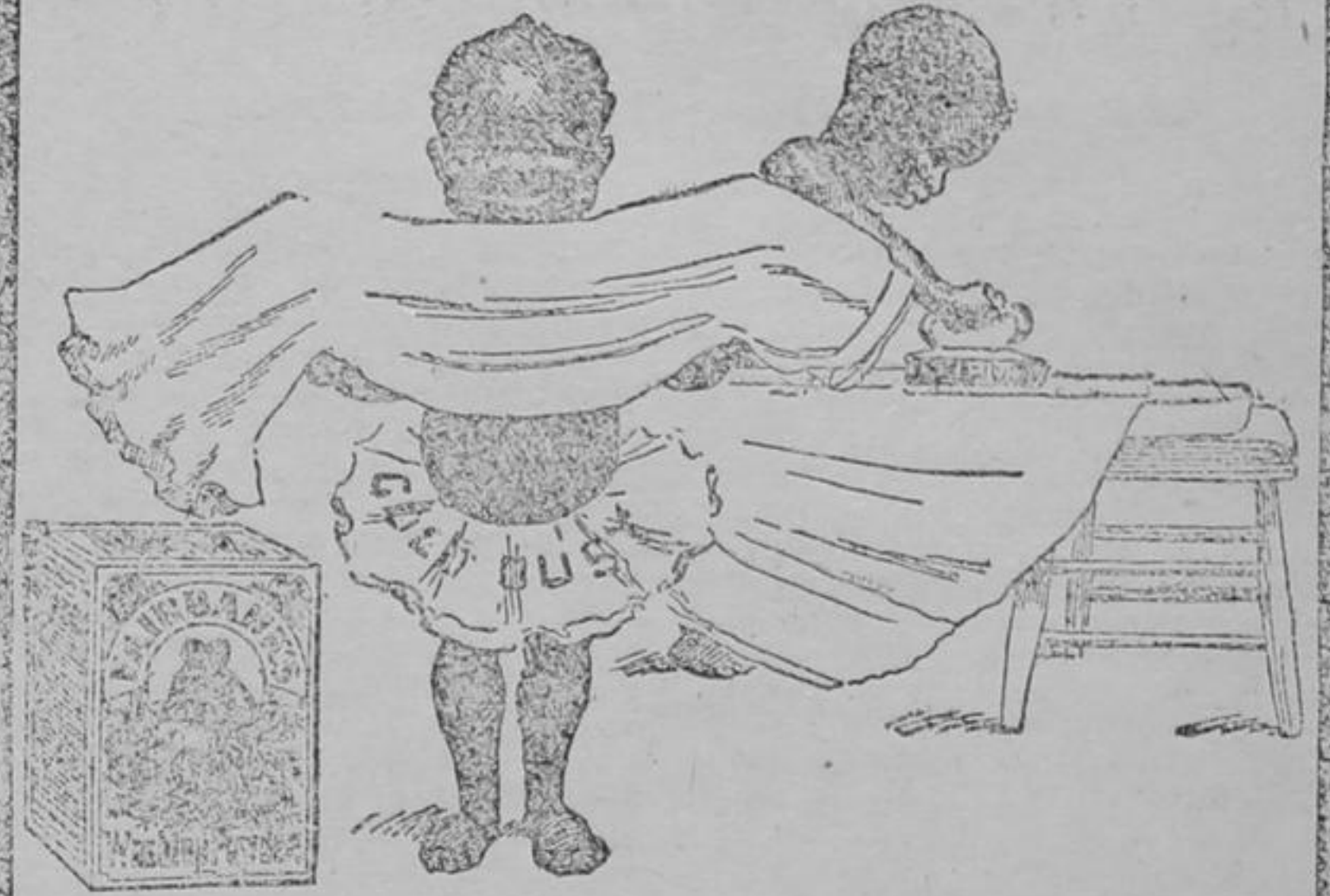

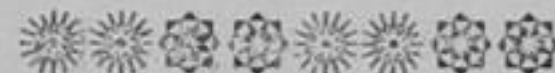
