**King Township Council**

Council met at Loch Erne, Saturday, June 27. All the members present excepting R. W. Phillips, who was absent owing to illness. Reeve Legge in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and adopted. A large number of accounts were read and ordered to be paid.

**Resolutions.**

Larkin—MacMurchy—that the reeve and Councillor Armitage be a committee to examine a drain in Schomberg, complained of by S. Leonard, and take any action they may approve.

Larkin—MacMurchy—that the following sheep claims be paid, the reports of the valuator being approved: James Scott, \$36; Geo. Hill, \$22.64; James McClure, \$8.00; John Wells, \$11.66.

Larkin—Armitage—that the following named persons be paid bonuses for building snow fences, under by-law, the inspectors' reports being approved: Peter McCallum, 31 1/2 rods, \$2.52; Joseph Baker, 40 rods, \$3.20; Thos. J. Ferguson, 47 rods \$3.76; Wm. Sharpe, 52 1/2 rods, \$4.20.

MacMurchy—Armitage—that Ed. Marshall be paid the sum \$2.00 per services as Sheep Valuator and H. O'Brien, \$1.00 and G. Hill \$1.00.

Larkin—Armitage—that the Clerk be and is hereby requested to write the Schomberg and Amora Railway and request them to repair railway crossings that require fixing, at a very early date.

MacMurchy—Larkin—that the treasurer loan the trustees of S. S. No. 3 \$75.00 on their note with interest at six per cent.

Larkin—Armitage—that the treasurer be instructed to pay Wm. Lloyd the sum of twenty-five dollars in full for claim against township for damages to threshing machine.

Larkin—Armitage—that the reeve, clerk and treasurer be a committee to compile a by-law, entitled a "General By-Law," for the municipal government of King Township, the same to contain all General By-Laws of the Municipality and submit the same at the next meeting of the Council.

Larkin—Armitage—that the Clerk be instructed to draw up a petition and request those interested in survey of lots 6, 7, 8, and 10, 3rd concession. Old survey to sign same as guarantee in payment of said survey, and on same being duly signed ask P. S. Gibson to make survey.

By-law No. 140 to authorize the reeve and treasurer to borrow three thousand dollars for current expenses received its several readings and passed.

Council adjourned to meet at Cosgroves' Hotel, Bond Lake, July 25th, 1903.

The Board met Monday evening. Minutes read and adopted. The report of Mr. Seath's visit to the High School, May 18, was read.
