**APPLE BLIGHT.**

A number of reports from widely separated districts, complaining of the ravages of the apple blight, have been received by the Fruit Division, Ottawa. Mr. Peter Anderson, Hepworth, Ont. thus describes the situation in his locality:—"Apples, both early and winter, are suffering from a new disease here. A blight struck the blossoms when in full bloom and withered them as if they had been scorched by fire. It is now withering the small twigs and limbs in the same way. The tops of the trees look as if fire had been applied to about one-half of the smaller branches until the leaves were all crisp and brown, and even the wood, as far as this extends, is evidently dead." Mr. Arch. MacColl, Aldboro, Ont. writes that many orchards in his locality are almost completely ruined by blight, and that many trees will have to be cut out. It is difficult to explain the origin of this trouble, but it is evidently of a bacterial nature. It appears to live over the winter fast in the margin of the affected part, near the healthy wood, and not in other parts of the tree or in the soil. Mr. W. T. Macoun of the Experimental Farm agrees with Mr. MacKinnon, Chief of the Fruit Division, that the only remedy is to cut out the blighted branches well below the affected part, say one foot below any appearance of blight. The knife used for this purpose should be thoroughly cleaned or sterilized before being again used on healthy wood. It is fortunate that the disease sometimes dies out of its own accord, especially in the case of the body blight. It is said to be conveyed from tree to tree by bees and insects, which would account for the great increase at blossoming time. The blight appears to develop very rapidly, and the maximum amount of damage is done almost as soon as the attack becomes noticeable. It will probably be found that the fall is the best time to cut out the affected wood, as the damage will not be much, if any, greater then than at present, and in the fall one may make sure of getting all the blighted portions.

As anything which stimulates an undue growth of succulent wood is conducive to blight, it would be well for the orchardist to cultivate and manure so as to produce a medium growth of strong healthy wood.

**COUNTY COUNCILS' ACT.**

The Municipal Act was amended at the last session of the Ontario Legislature by providing for a change in the composition of County Councils. By the amendment the Council of any municipality may by resolution declare that it is expedient that the council of such county should be composed of the Reeves of townships and villages and the mayors of towns not separated from the county, instead of representatives of the County Council divisions constituted under the Act. In case of a change the County Clerk must be notified on or before the first of October, in any year, immediately preceding a year in which County Councils are to be elected.

Formerly County Councils were composed of the Reeves and deputy Reeves of municipalities, each member having only one vote on all questions. Should the new law come into force the Reeves will have duplicate votes on all money appropriations of

\$1,000 and over in proportion to assessment.

We believe the proposed Act will be an improvement on that now in force as it will bring County Council representatives more in touch with the interest of the several local municipalities. We would have been satisfied, however, with the repeal of the present Act altogether, and allow Reeves and deputy Reeves to sit in County Councils as they did ten years ago. The cost was a little more and in a few cases the councils were probably somewhat large and unwieldy. County Councils, however, should be places of education for the members, and money spent in that way is spent to good advantage.

**PURIFY POLITICS.**

The Mail and Empire never seems to tire of dishing up rubbish to its readers. Yesterday that paper offered the gratuitous insult to intelligence by stating that "Mr. Ganey endeavored to purify the political atmosphere of this province" in the recent investigation.

The Mail and Empire must know that Mr. Ganey acknowledged on oath that he got his 16 year old son to sign the father's name to a letter, thereby making the son commit forgery. He stated in the House that three shorthand reporters had taken notes in the Crossen piano factory during the conversation between Ganey and Sullivan, when he knew that there was not a word of truth in the statement.

The same man took deposit slips from the bank under false pretenses, forged certain letters on the slips, and in brazen falsehood told the bank authorities that he returned the original slip to them. There is good reason to believe that no one but Mr. Ganey, in order to cover up his tracks, mutilated the Crossen-Ganey cash book just before the latter fled from the country.
