THE KING'S VISIT.

The visit of King Edward to Ireland will do much to strengthen the ties of peace and good-will between the English and the Irish people. It is conceded on all sides that the King in coming in personal contact with his Irish subjects has rendered an inestimable service to the Empire. Upon reaching English soil the first thing the King did was to issue an address thanking the Irish people for the kindness shown to the Queen and himself. The address contains these words of cheer, giving hope for Ireland's future happiness and contentment:—

"Wherever we have gone, in town or country, tokens of loyalty and affection, proffered by every section of the community, have made an enduring impression upon our hearts. For a country so attractive and a people so gifted, we cherish the warmest regard, and it is, therefore, with supreme satisfaction, that I have so often during our stay, heard the hope expressed that a brighter day is dawning upon Ireland. I shall eagerly wait for the fulfilment of this hope. Its realization will, under divine Providence, depend upon the steady development of self-reliance and co-operation; upon better and more practical education; upon the growth of industrial and commercial enterprise and upon the increase of mutual respect which the responsibility my Irish people now enjoy in the public administration of their local affairs, is well fitted to teach. It is my earnest prayer that those and other means of national well-being may multiply from year to year in Ireland, and that the blessings of peace, contentment and prosperity may be abundantly vouchsafed to her."

An article on the first page of The Toronto World of Monday goes to show that "terribly mistaken attacks of the Mail and Empire against the personality of Sir Wilfrid Laurier" are driving the French Canadians from the Conservative party into Sir Wilfrid's camp. The article contends that the tactics are "stupidly wrong," and gives the following as among the headlines taken from The Mail: "Laurier Insults Ontario," "The True Laurier," "Laurier Attacks Ontario," etc. It is hinted that if Mr. R. L. Borden, leader of the Dominion Conservatives, hopes to have a following in Quebec province he must keep his eye on such papers as The Mail and Empire.

On Thursday last Sir Wilfrid Laurier presented to the Canadian Commons the project of building a national railway from ocean to ocean. The agreement made by the Government and the Grand Trunk Pacific is that Canada will build the railway from Moncton on the east coast of New Brunswick to Winnipeg, and lease it to the G. T. P., whose promoters will continue the line to the Pacific coast, aided by a government guarantee of 75 per cent of the bonds. The liability incurred by the Government for the construction of the entire railway will not be more than \$13,000,000.

R. R. Gamey is being lionized in some Conservative circles, while in others he is receiving the cold shoulder of his former friends. The

Toronto World in giving an account of the recent demonstration says that "there is a perceptible rift in the Conservative lute in Manitoulin island. The President of the Conservative Association, B. H. Turner of Little Current, together with four or five of the prominent members of the executive, declined to take any part in the ovation to Gamey."

The World staff representative in naming some of the prominent Conservatives at the Gamey demonstration at Manitoulin says:—"The biggest men on the island to day are Dr. Beatty Nesbitt and J. W. St. John. The islanders stop work to see them walk by together."

The World man may have been in a sarcastic frame of mind when he penned the above words, but leaving all jokes aside it must have been an imposing sight.

The World says that Gamey made "a red-hot speech" at Manitoulin the other day. The World then quotes Gamey as saying "Stratton is guilty as hell." Surely the listeners did not want it any hotter than that.

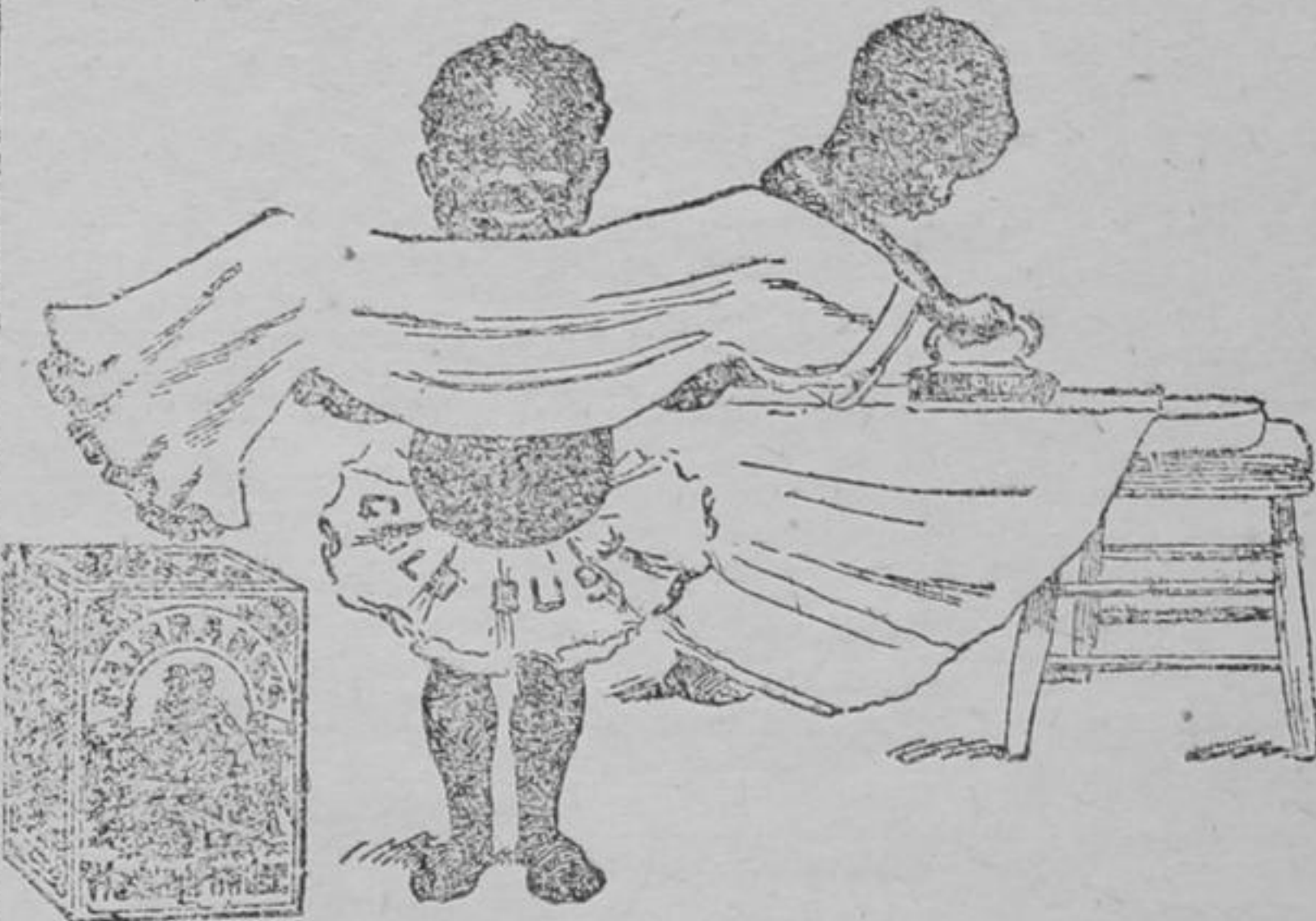
