FOR FALL FAIRS.

Fowls that are to be exhibited at fall fairs should be shaded from the sun during moulting. This will prevent the new feathers having a faded or mottled appearance. Breeders of fancy fowl are very particular in this respect, and cover the tops of the yards used by the moulting birds with old carpets, lumber, etc. The fowls are given liberty during the late afternoon and evening only. Animal food and vegetables are necessary for moulting fowls; the animal food, such as waste meat or raw bones will increase the supply of protein or albumen for the growth of feathers; the vegetables are useful in regulating the system.
