WATER FROM LEMONVILLE.

Dr. T. G. Law of Dearborn, who has been in the village and vicinity during the past two or three weeks has great faith in a scheme to supply the citizens on Yonge Street from Toronto northward with a supply of excellent water from artesian wells in the neighborhood of Lemonville. If the Dr. can get capitalists to see things the way he sees them he has no doubt that the necessary money will be forthcoming, and a company formed to promote the enterprise. In company with two gentlemen from Toronto the source of the water supply was visited a few days ago. They report that from one well alone the flow is a quarter of a million gallons per day. As an experiment 34 wells were sunk three years ago, and the flow seems to increase rather than diminish. The gentlemen who have been looking into this matter purpose applying to Parliament for a charter, and if a company can be formed the water will be brought in pipes by the line of Victoria Square, striking Yonge street at the Elgin Mills.

THE AUTUMN MILLINERY.
