THEN AND NOW.

The Newmarket Express-Herald objects to the Toronto News finding fault with the Conservative party for taking Mr. Tarte to its arms after that party had so recently denounced the ex-minister for his disloyal utterances. The Express-Herald says that Tarte was attacked and denounced by the Conservative press when he was guilty of disloyal utterances in France, and when he hoisted the French flag above the Union Jack in Quebec. But that paper reasons thus:

"If the Hon. Israel Tarte to-day put French institutions above British institutions, no denunciation meted out to him in the past would be too severe for him now. But he does not. While he is proud of his French origin he publicly announces that he is first of all a British subject and prepared to fight for the grand old flag."

There is little doubt that Hon. J. Israel Tarte said many things that were foolish for a politician to say, and which told against the Liberals at the last general election. But it is safe to say that the utterances of no man in Canada were ever more twisted and distorted than were Mr. Tarte's in order to answer the purpose of political opponents. We have never accused Mr. Tarte of anything more than playing to the grand stand, and doubt very much his hoisting the French flag above the Union Jack, but if he was ever disloyal will the Express kindly name the time and place that he renounced any so-called disloyal utterances that he ever made. If the Express is honest that paper will frankly admit that the only difference is that Mr. Tarte was supposed to be a Liberal then, whereas he is now back in the Conservative fold.

AN EDITOR SHOCKED.

The Leader and Recorder last week drew the attention of its readers to the fact that dancing was one of the attractions in front of the grand stand at the North York Fair at Newmarket. The article pretends to show that the editor is greatly shocked at such a performance, and says:—

"Startling to relate, that venerable moral reformer, Erastus Jackson, Esq., is Treasurer of the North York Fair. Yea, verily, and the posters announcing these gay amusements were printed at the office of Br'er Lyman George Jackson, son of Erastus, and also a great moral reformer."

If the editor of The Leader and Recorder objects to the Newmarket "attractions" surely it would be enough to scold the whole directorate without holding one or two individuals up to ridicule. The Junction editor would have its readers believe that if he were treasurer of such an institution as the North York Agricultural Society he would resign his position until such time as the directors ceased to have dancing at their fall fair. And besides he would not do a line of printing for them so long as they continued the wicked amusements.

As the Hon. E. J. Davis has for many years taken an active interest in the North York Agricultural Society, and actually visited the Fair on Wednesday, we cannot see how he escaped a severe castigation at the hands of the man of West York whose mission seems to be to look after the fine comb morals of the community.

There are always those both in Ontario and in Quebec who are ready on all occasions to say what will endanger the good feelings which should exist between the English and the French races. The patriotic words of Mr. L. P. Pelletier's, a few days ago have the right ring about them, and should be pondered over by those who are given to making inflammatory addresses. The following sentences are taken from a speech delivered by Mr. Pelletier at L'Esprairie:—"As a French Canadian," he said "I protest against the attempt being made to rouse French Canadian sentiment against England. I am a French-Canadian and I am proud of it. I am proud of the old country from which my fathers and yours came. I am proud of my French blood. I love my French-Canadian mother and my nationality. But do not let French-Canadians hearken to those who would rouse among them a sentiment of hostility to the country which has every right to our love and affection for the way we have been treated in this Canada of ours." He went on to say that he accepted the phrase "our-England," for he was proud of her splendid record. When the land that was the land of their fathers expelled saintly women from their holy houses they found refuge and a haven of protection beneath the broad folds of the grand old flag which also protected the rights and liberties of French-Canadians.
