**ENFORCING THE FRUIT MARKS ACT.**

The Inspectors of the Dominion Fruit Division are now devoting special attention to the enforcement of the Fruit Marks Act. Several prosecutions have taken place in Ontario all of which resulted in convictions, and several are now pending in Nova Scotia. These are mainly for marking inferior fruit No 1; although there is such a large amount of first-class fruit in the country packers still persist in trying to palm off inferior fruit as No. 1.

Mr. W. MacKinnon, Chief of the Fruit Division, says that retailers are beginning to understand the scope of the act much better than formerly, and appear well aware of the existence of the law and of the fact that it is being enforced by inspectors. They also understand the fact that it is at the disposal of any private citizen. A prosecution is now pending in Toronto by a private citizen against a retailer who is said to have disclaimed responsibility. Only a single basket is involved but it is clear that if individuals do not protect themselves in the case of single baskets, they are not likely to do so at all, as ninety per cent of their purchases are of single baskets. It will be the policy of the Department to hold the retailers more strictly to account in the future for the packages of fruit which they pass on to the public. If the retailers do not themselves complain when they find dishonest packing it is because they are willing to share in the fraudulent profit. Of course the original packer will always be prosecuted when he can be discovered, but that will not excuse the retailer.

A true bill has been found by the Grand Jury against the Metropolitan Railway Company for creating a nuisance by allowing their cars and baggage to stand on the siding at the terminus of the railway on Yonge Street at the C. P. R. Crossing. The position between the city and the Metropolitan regarding this matter is a peculiar one. The Company owns a lot adjoining the C. P. R., and are willing and anxious to remove their waiting-room and buildings on that lot, but the city will not agree to this proposal, thinking the Company would then cross the steam railway tracks and gain entrance into the city. All are agreed that the freight traffic at the present terminus is a nuisance, but the Company declare they would abate the nuisance if the city did not stand in the way. It is to be hoped that the Railway Company and the City Council will be able to arrange terms upon which the Metropolitan may enter the city.

The recent declarations of Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, late Secretary for the Colonies, in favor of moderate duties against foreign nations and a preference on imports from the colonies, appear to be viewed with favor in this country. Strong arguments are being used in favor of a fiscal change in Great Britain, and probably Chamberlain's is the most reasonable that has yet been presented. It can be shown that British trade with foreign nations has declined in recent years, and people are beginning to see that a change in their fiscal laws is necessary. The world at large would be much happier and much richer if Free Trade existed among all nations, but the wonder is that England has held her own as well as she has against countries that are highly protected.
