HORSE STOCK.

Geo. Cowie, the North-End blacksmith, has purchased and erected a Canadian Horse Stock for vicious horses and horses hard to shoe, and he finds it works well. The new contrivance can be handled with ease and safety for both man and horse, and when so many blacksmiths are compelled to measure their strength with the strength of heavy, vicious horses, the wonder is that the stocks are not oftener used in blacksmith shops. The frame is about ten feet long, it swings both ways when not in use up against the wall, there is a leg arm, and the hind feet can be handled as well as the fore feet. It is certainly a great contrivance for relieving the blacksmith from hard, dangerous work and there appears to be no danger of the horse getting hurt in the stock. The horse is fastened with ropes, and rests on a canvas placed under the body.
