The direct loss will probably be \$15,000.

### FELL TO INSTANT DEATH.

In a recent issue of THE LIBERAL we made brief mention of the sudden death of Mr. E. H. Coombs of Qvosso, Mich., U. S., eldest son of Mr. Fred Coombs of Bradford. Particulars of the sad accident have since come to hand. The Daily Press-American, of the 10th ult., says: "E. H. Coombs, head machinist and pipe fitter at the beet sugar factory met instant death at 12 o'clock to-day. He fell from under the pans on the fourth floor and struck the planking on the 3rd floor, twenty-five feet below. Just how he happened to fall is unknown, no one saw him until he was in the air midway between the floors. When the workmen reached him he was dead. His head was bruised and his neck broken. Mr. Coombs had been in the employ of the Kilby Company in the beet sugar department for fourteen years and was one of its most valued employees. He was a man of excellent habits and was very much liked by the men who worked under him. He leaves a widow and four children. Mr. Coombs had not been feeling well the past few days. He called on his dentist, Dr. Large, this morning, who treated him for toothache and made a date with him for this afternoon. He left the dentist's office at about 11.15—less than an hour before he met his death. Mr. Coombs was from Ontario, and his father, who resides at Bradford, has been notified of his death. Mrs. Coombs was nearly overcome when notified of her husband's tragic death but is bearing up bravely under the great strain. Mr. Coombs carried insurance in two companies. He took out a \$2,000 policy in the New York Life last month."  
Deceased was born at Carville, an learned his trade at the Patterson Works at Patterson.
