York County Council.
 Mr. J. C. Stokes of King, an ex-
 Warden of the County, was last week
 selected Keeper of the Industrial
 Home near Newmarket. Mrs. Stokes
 was appointed Matron.
 The York County Commissioners
 last week were quite within their
 rights when they reported to the
 Council that "Having learned that
 proceedings were being taken by the
 City of Toronto towards having
 certain changes made in the position
 of the city terminal of the Metropol-
 itan Railway and considering that this
 was a matter in which the county was
 vitally interested, we have instructed
 our solicitor to insist on the county
 being represented in any negotiations
 regarding such matter."
 The road between Humbler and
 Sunnyside was shown to be in a bad
 condition, and a writ was threatened
 Toronto for not keeping that road in
 proper repair.
 A good deal of time was spent rela-
 tive to alleged grievances of patrons of
 the Metropolitan Railway. Among
 the grievances were that the new cars
 were taken off; that the old cars were
 not properly heated; that panes of
 glass were broken in the cars and not
 replaced; and that the steam engine
 had been allowed to stand on Yonge
 street at the junction of the Schom-
 berg line, thereby frightening horses.
 Many of the councillors spoke very
 plainly. Councillor Evans made the
 remark that formerly he thought that
 the men at the head of suburban
 roads were clever, but he had come to
 the conclusion that they were lunatics.
 Instead of trying to please their
 patrons and make friends of them,
 they generally did the opposite.

Mr. Moyes, manager of the Metro-
 politan, was heard. He declared that
 the new cars were taken off merely to
 install new heaters in them. The or-
 der, said he, had been given three
 months ago, but when the parts came
 three weeks ago it was found a mis-
 take had been made. The new cars
 would be put on as soon as the heaters
 were in. Mr. Moyes claimed that
 every old car had a stove, and every
 stove had a fire. Regarding the en-
 gine on Yonge street Mr. Moyes knew
 nothing of it, but he would see that it
 be kept off. Mr. Landy introduced a
 resolution relative to a telephone
 system along the line.
 Before closing the work of the ses-
 sion on Saturday, Schomberg was
 created into a police village.

TAX ON RAILWAYS.
 H. J. Pettypiece, M.P.P. for East
 Lambton, who is advocating a change
 in the law of this Province whereby
 the tax on railways will be equal to
