### CENTRE YORK LIBERALS.

**ORGANIZING FOR THE DOMINION  
CAMPAIGN.**

An Enthusiastic and Harmonious Meeting.  
—Nominating Convention on December  
18.—Officers Elected.

The first formal steps towards or-  
ganizing the Liberals of the new rid-  
ing of Centre York were taken here  
Thursday afternoon, Dec. 3, when an  
association was formed. A conven-  
tion composed of delegates from each  
subdivision will be held here on Wed-  
nesday, 18th inst., for the purpose of  
nominating a candidate for the Dom-  
inion in order that the Liberals may  
be in readiness when the call comes to  
carry their banner to victory. The  
meeting was harmonious and en-  
thusiastic.

Mr. R. A. Mason, President of the  
East York Reform Association, pre-  
sided. Dr. P. D. MacLean, President  
West York Reform Association, urged  
the formation of an organization for  
the new riding of Centre York, and  
the proposal was unanimously con-  
curred in.

Messrs. W. H. Grant, Secretary East  
York Reform Association, and A. J.  
Anderson, Secretary West York Re-  
form Association, to whom was en-  
trusted the duty of preparing a con-  
stitution for the association, recom-  
mended the adoption of that of the  
West York Association. This was  
done with some modifications. It was  
decided that the association shall in  
the revision of voters' lists and other  
matters render assistance to and co-  
operate with the local organization in  
the polling subdivisions and munic-  
ipalities. The annual meeting was fixed  
for the second Thursday in January.

The following officers were elected:  
President, Michael Naughton, Vaugh-  
an township; 1st Vice-President, R.  
A. Mason, Markham; 2nd Vice-Pres-  
ident, Dr. McLean, Woodbridge; Sec-  
retary, A. F. Wilson, Markham Vil-  
lage; Treasurer, J. E. Switzer, Rich-  
mond Hill. The respective polling  
subdivisions will each elect a rep-  
resentative on the Executive Committee.

The business of organizing having  
been disposed of, Messrs. Archibald  
Campbell, M. P.; John Richardson,  
M. P., and N. W. Rowell, K. C., were  
called upon to address the meeting.  
Mr. Campbell said he regarded Cen-  
tre York as a constituency in which  
if they were united the Liberals could  
undoubtedly elect a supporter of the  
Dominion Government. And the  
Liberals could conscientiously do this,  
for the Laurier Government was the  
best the Dominion of Canada has ever  
had. They have had to face some of  
the most momentous questions that  
have ever come before Parliament, but  
have conducted the affairs of the coun-  
try so well that they certainly deserve  
a continuation of the confidence of the  
electors. Speaking of the redistribu-  
tion bill, he commended the Govern-  
ment for the fairness with which it  
had been drawn, and the manner in  
which the evils of the gerrymander  
had been wiped away. There had  
been, he learned, some objection to  
the manner in which York county had  
been divided, but these objections had  
not reached him when at Ottawa.  
The great trouble that had hitherto  
been experienced in East and West  
York was that the farmers of Mark-  
ham, Scarborough, Etobicoke and Vaugh-  
an had been swamped by the urban  
vote of the suburbs of Toronto. By  
the new division the urban were sepa-  
rated from the rural districts, and con-  
stituted South York, so that in each  
constituency there was a community  
of interest.

Mr. N. W. Rowell, K. C., congrat-  
ulated the association upon the har-  
mony and enthusiasm which charac-  
terized its formation. Discussing the  
arguments advanced by Conservatives  
why the Laurier government ought  
not to be continued in office, Mr.  
Rowell said that the proposal to ac-

change our tariff policy, be-  
cause there may be some change in  
conditions in days to come, although  
at present trade was increasing by  
leaps and bounds, would not appeal to  
the people. If any particular indus-  
try was suffering that was a matter  
for consideration but not a justifica-  
tion for a general increase in the  
tariff. The suggestions of the Man-  
ufacturers' Association that candidates  
should be pledged to support a total  
revision of the tariff upon the basis  
of the United States tariff was a piece  
of the greatest impertinence. Refer-  
ring to a personal matter, Mr. Row-  
ell said that he had been requested  
by a number of friends to permit his  
name to be placed before the nomi-  
nating convention as a candidate.  
While he most thoroughly appreciated  
the kind feeling expressed toward him-  
self and valued highly the friendships  
he had formed in East York, he in-  
timated that the demands of his pro-  
fession made it quite impracticable  
to accede to their desires.  
Mr. John Richardson, M. P., urged  
the importance of unity and ener-  
getic work. He endorsed all that  
had been said about the Laurier Ad-  
ministration, but was compelled to  
take exception to Mr. Campbell's state-  
ment that it was the best Government  
that ever existed. The Province of  
Ontario had in the government of Hon.  
Geo. W. Ross an Administration  
which would compare favorably with  
any other on the face of the globe.  
Regarding Centre York Mr. Richard-  
son said he would have preferred the  
adoption of the Provincial divisions for  
Dominion purposes, and with regard  
to the selection of a candidate was  
rather inclined to favor the home rule  
principle, believing it would be pre-  
ferable to select a resident of the rid-  
ing. When the selection is made all  
should unite to elect him.  
The meeting closed with the usual  
cheers.
