LIBERAL CONVENTION IN CENTRE YORK.

THE UNANIMOUS CHOICE IS MR. ARCH. CAMPBELL, M. P.

A most enthusiastic meeting to
nominate a candidate in the Liberal
interests for the Centre Riding of
York was held in the Masonic Hall
yesterday afternoon.
M. Naughton, Esq., President of the
Association, occupied the chair, and
on the platform were Mr. John Rich-
ardson, M. P. P., Dr. Maclean, Mr.
Hugh Clark and others. Thirty-eight
out of thirty-nine of the polling sub-
divisions in the riding sent delegates,
No. 11 Markham being the only divi-
sion not represented.

Each sub-division was entitled to
four delegates. The full number,
therefore, was 156, and 136 were pre-
sent and voted for the candidate of
their choice. Messrs. Andrew Russell,
J. B. Gould, and Hugh Clark as a cre-
dential committee distributed the
ballots, and when they were collected
it was found that Mr. Campbell had
received 118 votes out of the 136. On
motion of Dr. Maclean the nomination
was made unanimous amid loud ap-
plause. Mr. Campbell, who was in
the village, was then sent for, and
awaiting his arrival short pithy
speeches were made by Mr. C. Porter
and Mr. John Richardson, M. P. P.
The latter congratulated the conven-
tion on their choice, thought an ex-
cellent selection had been made, and
prophesied that by good work Mr.
Campbell would be returned with a
large majority when the election
takes place.

On motion of Dr. Sisley of Agin-
court, seconded by Mr. Pearson of
Weston, a resolution was unanimously
carried containing an expression of
gratitude for the restoration to health
of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and expressing
full confidence in his Government.

When the nominee of the conven-
tion entered the hall he was loudly
cheered, and this was again renewed
when the chairman informed him of
his unanimous nomination. Mr.
Campbell thanked the convention for
the nomination tendered, and assured
those present that he would always
endeavor to look after the interests
of his constituents. As a miller Mr.
Campbell said he was in touch with a
great many farmers, buying from
them annually from 75,000 to 100,000
bushels of wheat. The speaker re-
ferred to the general prosperity of the
country, and dwelt at some length on
the Trade Question. While believing
it was often safer to let well enough
alone, Mr. Campbell thought that the
tariff should be revised at an early
date. He had given a pledge that he
would vote for higher Protection for
the produce of market gardeners, and
he would do so when a revision of the
tariff takes place, believing it to be
right. Mr. Campbell again thanked
the electors present for the nomina-
tion and hearty reception, and con-
cluded an able speech.
The meeting closed with cheers for
the King, and the candidate.

What are our Taverns For?

To the Editor of THE LIBERAL
SIR.—On Monday evening last a
woman, to all appearance a respectable
person, came to Richmond Hill, with
a view to canvassing the village next
day, to try and sell some goods she
had with her. She says she applied to
each of our tavern-keepers for lodging
and offered to pay for accommodation,
but was refused by them. The conse-
quence was the poor woman was com-
pelled to abandon her business
enterprise here and took passage on
the car for Toronto and seek shelter
for the night in the city.

Tavern-keepers are licensed for the
purpose of accommodating travellers,
and are not justified in refusing per-
sons who apply and offer to pay their
way.
It may be as well to bring this mat-
ter under the notice of the License
Commissioners, in order that travel-
lers may not be treated in such a
heartless manner.

A SAD CASE.

The following letter, addressed to
the Secretary of the National Sanitari-
um Association, Toronto, from the
rectory, Norwood, Ont., and signed
by Rev. J. McKee McLennan, a well-
known Anglican minister of the pro-
vince, needs no comment of ours. It
reads: "I desire to secure the admis-
sion into the Free Hospital for Con-
sumptives at Gravenhurst of a young
woman, a member of my parish. The
case is a very sad one, and if help can
at once be given, a promising life can
be saved. Three years ago the
mother died of consumption. Since
that time it has been my painful duty
to bury two of the sons with the same
disease. Now Annie, aged about
seventeen, and a boy of fourteen, are
all that remain of the family. The
poor girl has been in Muskoka, board-
ing at a private house, waiting to be
admitted. She returned home last
week, and within 24 hours of her re-
turn her father dropped dead in his
buggy driving into Norwood. The
case is surely one that must appeal to
the sympathies of everyone, and yet,
I fear, only one of the many that are
constantly coming under our notice."
