The Liberal.

RICHMOND HILL December 17, 1903

The speech of Sir Richard Cartwright delivered in Toronto a few evenings ago showed clearly that Canada had made wonderful strides during the seven years we have been under Liberal rule. The ex-Finance Minister pointed out that during the past seven years the rate of growth in Canada's total trade has been greater than that of any other country. From 1867 to 1896 our total annual trade increased by \$100,000,000. From 1897 to 1903 it increased by \$230,000,000. The increase in our annual trade in the past seven

years was \$130,000,000 greater than in the previous thirty years. In four months of this year as compared with the same four months of last year, there was an increase of \$22,023,653. In fourteen years between 1882 and 1896 the increase was \$16,851,202. In four months of this year the trade increase was more than \$5,000,000 greater than in the fourteen years preceding the Laurier Administration.

The population of the country increased more in the past year than in ten years preceding 1896. More people settled in the West this year than in the entire thirty years preceding 1896.
